MARION'S PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends

We have all enjoyed some beautiful weather during the past few days, and it is good to see snowdrops and daffodils and aconites showing their faces despite the chilly winds we are all experiencing. Spring is certainly just around the corner. There is warmth in the sun and new life is showing itself in all sorts of ways. Indeed, it feels as though we are emerging from a very long winter of



Covid restrictions, although there is still a long way to go, and of course the situation in Ukraine is unspeakably awful. But even amongst all of this, there is new life.

The season of Easter is all about new life, for our Lord Jesus Christ defeated sin and death and rose to new life for us. During his earthly life, Jesus demonstrated so many facets of God's love for his people in the way that he lived. And in his death on the cross we see just how far that love was prepared to go for each one of us. But sadly, there are still so many people who think the story ends in the dereliction of the cross, when in reality it is the glory of the Resurrection that we celebrate at Easter. It is that miraculous event that shows us that the love of God for all his people is far more powerful than all the forces of evil that the world could ever imagine.

This means that the Resurrection is the central and most important event of the Christian year, and without it there would be no Christian faith. So it is that Easter Day should be for all of us a time of joy and renewal as we greet the Risen Christ. But there is more than that, for

all people of faith are not just promised new life after death, important and comforting though that is, but that all people of faith are to be made new here and now through the power of the Resurrection.

The question for us is then, will people of no faith be able to recognise in us the new life and joy that Easter brings with it? There are of course, many people who find the whole concept of the Resurrection very difficult to believe. Where, they say, is the proof? It was the great preacher John Stott who said this. 'It was the Resurrection that transformed Peter's fear into courage and Thomas's doubt into faith. It was the Resurrection that changed the Sabbath into Sunday, and the Jewish remnant into the Christian Church. It was the Resurrection that changed Saul the Pharisee into Paul the Apostle, and turned his persecuting into preaching, his hatred into love.' How then will the Resurrection change us?

Elsewhere in this magazine you will find details of all our services for Passiontide and Easter. Do come and join us in worship so that you can experience the new life and joy of Easter for yourselves.

SHAPING UP!

In any reorganisation of our parishes, place is important. How else can we witness to the Gospel effectively if we cannot witness where we are with the people round about us?

The shape of ministry must change. We dare not see it exclusively in terms of the past. Younger ministers are trained differently. They belong to a different age. They have new things to share out of their contemporary treasure chests.

Buildings need to be rationalised but we shouldn't spend forever arguing about them. We have more important things to do with our time, money and energy. We must exercise a ministry of letting go.

Some patterns of congregational life are not sustainable. We must let them go too and see what takes their place. We need to open our doors to younger people with fresh ideas and stop holding on too tightly to power and influence!

Our life is transient and we should resist the temptation to live as if everything was permanent and should remain the same forever. This is daft! We should strive to let go what is precious to us whenever it is hindering others.

This is what it means to lose our life and live for others. And in embracing a new perspective, we sense the urgency of playing our part now - for nothing lasts. In this way we bring hope to the world.

But there are two things which we should never let go. The first is a qualified ministry. At the Reformation, John Knox and his ilk refused to compromise on standards of excellence. When they produced their reorganisation package, the number of candidates for the ministry was inadequate.

'We are not ignorant that the rarities of godly and learned men shall seem to some a just reason why that so strait and sharpe examination should not be taken universally, for so it shall appearethat the most part of the Kirks shall have no minister at all.' they observed in 'The First Book of Discipline'.

'But let these men understand, that the lack of able men shall not excuse us before God, if by our consent unable men be placed over the flock of Christ Jesus.' The solution – prayer for God's providence and the birth of a new office of Reader.

The second thing we shouldn't let go is our identity as a parish church and the missionary endeavour which lies behind it, inspiring us to become disciples of Christ. This is most formally encapsulated in the words of the third of our nine 'Articles Declaratory of the Constitution of the Church of Scotland in Matters Spiritual'.

'As a national Church representative of the Christian Faith of the Scottish people it acknowledges its distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry.'

Note. It doesn't talk about ministers but ministry and so we acknowledge that it is the ministry of Christ which is being celebrated by all those who participate in a ministry within the Kirk. Traditionally, the Parish Minister has been at the forefront of ministering to those who do not belong in wedding and funeral services, assorted pastoral care, school chaplaincy etc.

But the 'Church Without Walls' initiative drew our attention to the fact that this is a ministry which belongs to the whole Church for it is supremely the ministry of Christ. We are all called to have this outward-looking, forward-thinking, collaborative, life-enhancing perspective on bringing the love of God to our neighbourhood and sharing the joy of living in Christ. We have the Audit. The 'Place for Hope' is leading our discussion. What are we waiting for?

The Kate Kennedy procession resumes this year, but I am told that it will not be along South Street.


Comings and goings

Property matters



Revival

I was talking to a friend from another church recently and she said how wrong she thought it was when in the early days of lockdown congregations were told they must close their church doors and refuse to let anyone in. I tried to explain that this was a government order and had to be obeyed by everyone. I'm not sure that I convinced her but did my best.

Now the regulations have been eased and those who wish can worship together in church or elsewhere. In Holy Trinity it has been a great joy to welcome our organist and choir back and to sing God's praise either in our beautiful building or by live-stream on our screens or quietly with our service sheets. Whatever the rules and regulations our God is ubiquitous – everywhere – and we can praise, worship and call on him wherever we are. Some people have come back to church with joy, while others, for all kinds of reasons, have held back not wanting to expose themselves or others to possible infection. Others, like my friend, have found it hard to forgive our church leaders for obeying the rules and closing the churches just when we needed them most, and have decided not to go back now the rules have been eased,

This is all happening at a time when our own Church of Scotland and other denominations are planning to close "uneconomic" church buildings, leaving communities without a church building within easy reach. This may be understandable but when I read of such closure plans I find myself asking — "What if there is a revival? " As I read my newspaper and listen to the news, I wonder whether God is preparing us to come closer to him and cry for help in this changing world. What will our world be like in the next few years? How will our church leaders face up to it, and how will we react?

WHAT IF

instead of trying to balance the books and prop up an ailing church, our church leaders were to preach Revival, a Coming Back to God, a wave of trust and prayer from each of us for our own church and parish and for the world, and to make a commitment to pause all closures for a period, trusting God to use the time to bring us back to him and work for the coming of his kingdom not just here where we are but all over his world.

WOULD it, COULD it work and change our street our parish our town our country and our world?

If we trust in God and believe his promises, it could.

From Fife Presbytery Mission Director

Hi all.

I have very fond memories of my time as an undergraduate divinity student at St Andrews, now a little over 13 years ago. During that time, I was welcomed and worshipped with yourselves at Holy Trinity. It was very different to the church I had grown up in and I remember the sense of awe I felt there. A mixture of powerful choral music, formal Presbyterian liturgy focused on both Word and Sacrament, mission and outreach that sought to serve the parish community of St Andrews.



Inspired at the time by the Church Without Walls initiative that encouraged a mission-focus for the Church of Scotland. And of course, what I remember most fondly is the friendship, kindness and fellowship shared with yourselves.

Since leaving St Andrews and Holy Trinity, I have been working for the Church of Scotland in the East End of Dundee as a Ministries

Development Staff (MDS) worker, developing work with young people and the wider community in an area with some of the highest levels of poverty and deprivation in Scotland. I established an anti-poverty church/community initiative RockSolid that supported young to the young at heart, through a mixture of community-based youth work, health & wellbeing and personal development activities. From its inception as a Friday night youth group it grew significantly over a period of years into a charity providing support 7 days a week for all ages, led by myself and a passionate team of staff, volunteers and students.

Alongside this work I was also heavily involved in school chaplaincy to local Primary and High Schools, coordinated children's and youth ministries and worked closely with ecumenical colleagues to develop partnerships and support other local projects.

Before I knew it 10 years had passed by! And I find myself returning to Fife, now as the Mission Director for our new Fife Presbytery. I am encouraged and excited by the prospect that through the uniting of the three former Presbyteries, as we develop our Christian witness across Fife for the future, that there is to be a strong focus on mission. I have no doubt that it will not be without both its fair share of challenges and difficult decisions. Nevertheless, it is my hope that instead of simply managing ever decline, we can as a Presbytery and congregations be bold. Bold in our faith in Christ Jesus. Bold in aspirations for worship and witness. Bold in service for caring and compassion. Bold to remember we are to be a Church Without Walls.

I look forward to, hopefully before too long, being able to visit and sharing again in fellowship with you. And in my new role, in supporting and encouraging you to be bold in achieving your own mission-focus and vision for the congregations at Boarhills & Dunino and Holy Trinity.

"So if the old way, which has been replaced, was glorious, how much more glorious is the new, which remains forever! Since this new way gives us such confidence, we can be very bold. Because of Christ and our faith in him, we can now come boldly and confidently into God's presence." - 2 Corinthians 3:11-12



Some Presbyteries are moving ahead and planting new churches, such as Ardnamurchan, where all the local churches had closed.







The Trinity – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit

May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. 2 Corinthians 13:13, NIV

In today's verse we see that God is three in one, a trinity. The trinity has always been there, working for the good of the Body of Christ, in harmony.

We have God the Father, the I AM. He is the One who breathed life into the nostrils of Adam, and the One who spoke everything into existence. He is the One who opened Sara's womb and made from her a nation.
