Dear Friends

SAINT FOR OUR TIMES?

In May, Pope Francis canonised ten people during a papal mass in St. Peter's Square. The congregation exceeded 45,000 people. In his homily, the Pope said, 'Holiness does not consist of a few heroic gestures, but of small acts of daily love.'

He was reframing sainthood from great acts of heroism to more modest acts of kindness.



The former focuses our attention on the saint rather than on Christ and on what the saint has achieved rather than what Christ achieves through us without us even knowing it.

One of the people canonised was Charles de Foucauld, a French priest and hermit. When I was a student, I read a biography of him. Three things struck me about him. Firstly, he was murdered ministering to others. Secondly, he failed to achieve his ambition to create a small community of like-minded followers of Jesus.

It was only after his death that the 'Little Brothers and Sisters of Jesus' was formed. It was almost despite his efforts to fulfil this ambition that the work of God was accomplished. This is in harmony with the third thing which struck me – his honesty in the difficulties he had in his spiritual life. I found his notes encouraging and strangely uplifting:

'I find everything difficult ... communion, prayer ... everything, even telling Jesus that I love him ... I have to cling on to the life of faith. If only I felt that Jesus loved me. But he never says so.

Before the Blessed Sacrament ... everything seems empty, hollow, meaningless, except for the fact that I am at the feet of our Lord, contemplating him ... and when I am at his feet, I am dry, arid, without a word or a thought, and often, alas, I end up by going to sleep.

At least four evenings in a row I have gone to sleep while writing down these meditations.'

A saint for our times? I think so — and for three reasons. Like de Foucauld, our work may not be in the desert but it takes place in a barren landscape where many people are indifferent to the Gospel which the Kirk preaches, the way it preaches it and the life which emerges from it.

Secondly, we are under pressure to make things happen, to get results. We are being constrained by money and quotas and perhaps worst of all, expectations of growth which are not only unrealistic but blasphemous. Growth doesn't belong to us but to God. We play our part. 'I planted. Apollos watered but God gave the growth.' says a wise St. Paul.

Thirdly, we are not inclined to value the ordinary, the small, the thoughtful and the virtues of loyalty, perseverance, hiddenness. God's work is often to be found in the hiddenness of a cloud in wilderness or on mountain top. The problem for us is that we like to plot and piece his work as evidence of our value. But the divine mathematics defies this analysis.

God is infinite so there is no way in which we can construct a mechanism or a set of words or a book of assessment indicators to discern or contain or unravel the will and the actions of God with infinite exactitude. Only faith in the desert and the darkness bears exceptional fruit which we may never taste for the harvest is in God's time alone!


Words from the 24/7 Prayer initiative

The General Assembly 2022

Apart from the vote on gay marriage, which had the press licking their lips, the Assembly proceedings were not widely publicised. There is not space here to cover all that went on; There is an excellent supplement to Life and Work which



summarises the proceedings. It is available on the CofS website.

My impressions, as a commissioner was that, the church has finally grasped the seriousness of its exclusion from the public domain, but is seriously addressing these issues. The new Moderator Rev Ian Greenshields, is from Dunfermline, in our Presbytery. He talked about the 99 sheep and the One. Only nowadays it is the 99 that are lost! He challenged us to go and preach the gospel and bring them in. The New

Principal Clerk, Rev Fiona Smith, will also be living in Fife and is a real 'woman of God'

I was encouraged by the wonderful speeches by a Rabbi on behalf of the Jewish population of Scotland, of The ex-Archbishop of York, John Sentamu and the promulgation of the 'St Margaret's declaration', laying to rest centuries of bitterness between the C of S and the Catholic Church (Bishop Sharp and Rangers please note).

As an aside, there is to be a new confession of faith to be put beside

Rt Rev Dr lain Greenshields, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland; Most Reverend Leo Cushley, Archbishop and Metropolitan of St Andrews and Edinburgh

the Westminster Confession. Our dear John Duncan was also warmly thanked for his years in the ministry.

On church growth, we were told that

"The Free church in the North of Scotland has a goal to plant 30 new churches between the Black Isle and Thurso in the next 10 years."

Hi all,

Pioneer Mission Fund

This has been established. It aims to support local church growth and had a particular emphasis on church planting and establishing 100 new worshipping communities.



The fund will be open to applications between April and September 2022 with

assessments being made between June and December or until the monies are exhausted.

The fund will have an initial £100,000 made available from central resources

Grants of up to £10,000 can be applied for by:

- Individual Church of Scotland churches and Presbyteries
- Groups of churches or Presbyteries
- Individuals through and with the support of their church or Presbytery

There will be no limits given on the reserves a church or Presbytery may hold in terms of applicability to apply.

Projects should support:-

- local church growth.
 - church planting.
 - the establishment of new worshipping communities.

projects should meet each of the following four criteria.

Missional – work with non-churchgoers.

Contextual – fitting the context of where you are situated.

Formational – aiming to form disciples.

Seeing itself as part of the worldwide Christian community, shaped by the gospel

Draft Presbytery mission plan

The plan was agreed at the June Presbytery meeting.

This means that it now proceed to the Faith and committee to be ratified.

Movement toward the implementation of the plan should commence on 1 Jan 2023 and full implementation (Which will require much discussion), has to be completed by the end of 2025



Thoughts (1)

I don't know how many Holy Trinity and Dunino members watch Coronation Street, possibly not as many as those who like me have roots in the North of England. The scriptwriters keep me guessing from episode to episode and the plot-lines often deal with important social issues such as how easy it is for ordinary people to get trapped into drug dealing, to undergo coercive bullying by a partner, or to suffer from an eating disorder, and I find I learn a good deal about other people's lives and problems from Coronation Street.

Although a vicar is one of the characters in the series, the Church is not a very positive force in the episodes. The vicar's views on worship, forgiveness and wrong-doing have little place in the scripts. Except for wedding and funerals the local church is rarely visited and plays little positive part in the life of The Street. Terrible disasters hit the characters husbands turn out to be serial killers, sons are killed by angry school friends, a toddler is ill and dies and his mother is devastated, but the vicar and his parishioners, who rarely appear in the scripts, seem quite uninvolved, and the local bishop's visits are a disaster for the vicar. He himself has trouble with personal relationships and finds it really hard to help his deceased friend's teenage daughter who now lives with him to accept the constraints of her diabetic condition, her eating disorder, and her inability to limit the scope of her preparation for her A level exams. I don't feel I'd be very happy as a member of the Coronation Street Church.

I hope you are feeling grateful, but not smug, that "our" church isn't like that, but sadly it is how many people see the churches in their midst. And yet were churches to close and congregations disband, don't you think that there would be a huge hole in the social care in our communities, one that community councils, always strapped for cash and not always fully aware of hidden needs, would struggle to fill?

Holy Trinity and Dunino aren't perfect by any means, but their members and their minister do have a vision, imperfect, perhaps, but a vision all the same of what God expects and hopes for from us. It's what those who joined the church, more recently or many years ago, signed up for. Like the Queen we promised to do faithfully the tasks God entrusts to us. As we celebrate our Queen's long life of service, might this be a good

time to stop and ask God to sharpen our vision and show us what he is planning for us to do for others in our church, in our town, in our work, faithfully, every day. It isn't and won't be easy, but Pentecost will soon be here when we remember* that the God who sent Jesus to show us how to be his people also sent the Holy Spirit to help us to use the gifts he has given us. Try to spend a little time in the next few days and weeks asking God to show you what more you can do in his service and give you the courage to attempt it.



Some reading suggestions

"At the beginning of Lent, a friend gave me an unexpected present and it turned out to be a joyous gift. It was a book by Richard Harries' Seeing God in Art'.

He has chosen 30 works of art and for him they represent the essence of Christianity. They range from a fifth century mosaic of Moses and the burning bush to a 2003 painting of Pentecost.

Beside each he has written a reflection and ended with a prayer.

Among the most meaningful for me, is one Chagall painted in 1995 of the

Exodus. He was from Belarus, next to Ukraine and he shows a group of grey human beings fleeing and they are watched over by the outstretched arms of Christ.

I used the book in different ways.

Each image shows an artist's insight into the Christian story.

I found the reflections especially helpful.

Richard Harries is a former Bishop of Oxford and his writing shows his wisdom, learning, humanity and a lifetime's devotion to Christ.

The prayer at the end of each section can be used as a devotion.

It was indeed a gift to be treasured. "

Photos and illustrations by his wife Rev Margaret Stein make this an attractive book to read.





Sorry to stress the point - but If we are to go anywhere, with church unions, choice of buildings, development of mission and many other things, we need you to both input and help.


