


Dear All,

MARION'S PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends,

Some years ago there was an article in the 'Church Times,' the newspaper of the Church of England, that said 'Academics at Duke University in North Carolina undertook a study of 4000 people aged 65 and over who were mainly Protestants. They found that those who regularly read the Bible, prayed, or attended church services were 40% less likely to have high blood pressure and the illnesses that are associated with it.' The writer also observed that church going very probably

boosts the immune system for everyone, although there were no statistics to support this at the time. In the years that have followed, many secular newspapers in the UK have carried similar articles which is interesting! So there you have it. It is official. Church going is good for you!

However, you would be surprised at the number of people who say, sometimes rather wistfully, 'I really miss going to church, I always went when I was young and it used to set me up for the week. But somehow, I got out of the habit, and now it is so hard to go back.



There has generally been a reason, often a very good reason why people have stopped going to church. But the reason is often so far back in the mists of time that even they cannot remember what it was. They have got out of the habit, and don't quite know how to get started again. And it it really can be difficult to get started again because some things will have changed. But progress always brings change with it and it is good to be part of that change.

And one thing never changes. 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and for ever.'

And his

love for his people is constant.

So here is a challenge for all of us. As we get back into routine after the summer, let us each try to bring at least one person back to church who used to come. After all, there is real and compelling medical evidence to say that that church-going is good for your physical health and well-being. And after the pandemic many people are anxious to keep themselves as well as possible. There are many interesting activities in our church that new people could be involved with, and so much more we could be doing if more people were involved. Add to that the welcome that awaits everyone who comes, and you can see how good it would be to start coming again.

But what about mental and spiritual health and well-being? Sadly there are many people who try to ignore these aspects of their lives, even though both are important parts of the whole person. Since the pandemic we are hearing much about the damage that the restrictions have done to the mental health of both young and old. Add to that the spiritual starvation that so many of all faiths have suffered, and you can see that great challenges lie ahead. The medical profession are increasingly encouraged to look at everything that makes up a person, and not just physical illness. Our communities would be better and safer places if everyone did more to look after their mental and spiritual health as well as their physical health.

As the winter approaches, we may be thinking about ways in which we can keep well, particularly when many of us are being offered covid boosters and flu vaccines. But as the cost of living rises and it is harder to keep the house warm and afford good food, it is going to be even harder for everyone. So now that it is official that church going is good for your physical, mental and spiritual health, there is something positive that can be done to help. Why not come and join, or rejoin, us in worship and fellowship and experience the benefits for yourself? You can be sure of a warm welcome.

Since writing, we have been rocked by the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The end came very suddenly and unexpectedly and we are told very peacefully, just two days after confirming the appointment of a new Prime Minister. I know many of you will have, as I have, watched the tributes to her late Majesty, and I would like to share with you here some of what I said on Sunday morning 11th September.

"Since the passing of her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth on Thursday September 9th, our nation, the commonwealth, and the global community has been responding to an absence. Most of us cannot remember a time when Queen Elizabeth was not on the throne. She was, as our new Prime Minister said, "the rock upon which our modern nation has been built". But there is more to it than that, for Queen Elizabeth herself never made any secret of the fact that her whole life was anchored upon the rock which is Christ himself.

It was interesting to see how the sombre mood of the crowds at Buckingham Palace changed when King Charles III arrived in London the day after the queen's passing. Immense sadness, yes, enormous sympathy yes, but also a really positive response to the new monarch. And it was heartening to hear him speak about his personal faith as he promised to devote his life to the service of our nation, the commonwealth and the world, under God, just as his mother had done.

The gap left by her passing will never be completely filled because he will be different. She will always be remembered with love and respect, and because of her passing, for some hours the nation was lost in its grief, But although that grief will naturally continue for many months, a new positivity is now in evidence as our new king takes up his duties of service under God.

AN EMERGING VISION

Sometimes it is difficult to see the wood from the trees. However, the recent Annual Stated Meeting of the congregation in July was a chance to reflect on what has happened at Holy Trinity during the past twenty months. That is my timeframe because on 10 November 2020, the Kirk Session made two significant decisions.

It had been asked by the Presbytery of St. Andrews to reflect on the Goring Report into the future of the congregation and agreed by 19 votes to 4 to do two things. Firstly, participate in an Audit of St. Andrews and secondly, explore the possibility of becoming a sponsoring congregation for a Presbytery Mission Initiative. This was Goring's imaginative development of 'Breakfast@Trinity'.



The Audit was undertaken by Brendan Research and completed at the end of 2021. All three kirks in St. Andrews paid £1,000 each for this vital research. Since then 'Place for Hope' has facilitated discussion across the three congregations from the turn of the year. This work began with ministers and Session Clerks and now includes representatives of each congregation.

Running alongside this, the Presbytery of Fife has produced its Presbytery Plan which is due to be approved in September. The St. Andrews' Cluster which includes Boarhills and Dunino and Cameron has been allocated 2.5 FTE of whom two will be Ministers of Word and Sacrament and 0.5 FTE, a Pioneer Minister who is being called to facilitate new work amongst families and young people etc.

In a former day, when we talked about ministry, we were talking about Ministers of Word and Sacrament. That no longer applies. A Full-time Equivalent may refer to another type of ministry – deacon, youth worker, family worker etc. Here, the Pioneer Minister will probably be a person trained in the particular skills which the Cluster determines are required for future development.

The Plan states that the Cluster should develop and form a Team Ministry and consider future building requirements for ministry and mission. All five kirk buildings have been given an A categorisation. They are 'to be retained beyond the five years from the date at which the Mission Plan is approved or annually reviewed'.

On 9 March 2022, the Kirk Session at Holy Trinity expressed its willingness to unite with St. Leonard's and St. Mark's under existing ministries. This was reported to the other two ministers, the Director of Mission and the Presbytery Clerk. The other two Kirk Sessions agreed in similar terms but included the recommendation that one building should be used and the united Kirk Session should decide.

However, it cannot be assumed that a union can take place under existing ministries until the two ministers at St. Leonard's and St. Mark's have reflected on their sense of call and agreed to be called to this union. They are being invited to consider taking on a

different job from the one to which they have been called. This requires time for discernment.

Four things need to be said about the immediate future of Holy Trinity. Firstly, it will continue under Presbytery Guardianship until readjustment takes place. Secondly, it will continue to appoint a locum whilst the congregation remains in Guardianship. However, on 1 January 2026, Guardianships will start counting as a 0.25FTE which will then constitute a part of the Presbytery's national allocation of ministry.

Thirdly, the Pioneer Minister who has been allocated to the Cluster could be called to the Cluster anytime. Fourthly, HTAG continues its imaginative and exciting work to reenvision the external spaces in the kirk and their use for the benefit of kirk and community. Whether the Holy Trinity building is chosen for the union or not, the work of HTAG will be invaluable.

Looking back over the past twenty months, you can see some astonishing changes on the landscape:

- O The Audit has been accomplished and ecumenical discussion continues
- O The possibility of a Pioneer Ministry and a mission initiative have been secured
- O A willingness to unite across the three kirks has been agreed although formal voting has yet to take place
- O The church building has been allocated an A category
- O HTAG has already accomplished greater usage of the building and at the ASM produced a well-documented vision for the future.

What are the next steps?

- O The completion of 'Place for Hope' discussions
- O The identification of a mission Initiative to be supported by all three kirks
- O Discerning the nature of a Pioneer Ministry.
- O Agreement on a suitable time-frame for the above
- O The continuation of HTAGs work re the development of Holy Trinity's much loved church building

Reflecting on the above, there is some excitement about the present development and future prospects of all three kirks within the town. A lot of work remains but the direction of travel is emerging in stronger hues.

The ecumenical endeavour taking place across the cluster with the ministers, youth workers and Guilds is very encouraging. The ministries of music, pastoral care, Word and Sacrament continue steadfastly. The use of the kirk and the Church Hall by other denominations and community organisations has been extraordinary and the loving embrace which the town gives to HTAG's initiatives augurs well for future development. Sometimes change doesn't seem to be happening at all and people wonder if we are moving. This snapshot, covering the past twenty months, is just that. It is not the whole picture. Much more is happening than any one person can see. For as Cowper reminds us, 'God moves in a mysterious way.' And any growth which happens is not ours to claim but His to celebrate!



News from the Cluster (The grouping of the churches in St Andrews and the linked rural churches)

At a recent meeting of representatives from the St Andrews congregations I shared the possibility of holding free, weekly, simple soup lunches in St Mark's as a means to lessen isolation (perhaps pandemic related, perhaps not) and build fellowship. This possibility was welcomed by those attending. The recently published community audit identified how some local residents felt a sense of exclusion with no affordable



place to go to eat in town. The fact that inflation is high and utility bills are heading upwards as we move towards winter only increases the reasons for going ahead with it.

The former Hope Park and Martyrs Church had the Roundabout Café and TOAST (a weekly breakfast initiative where people from the community and students shared breakfast and conversation). These were both found to be worthwhile. As our three congregations draw closer together Graeme, David and I agreed weekly soup lunches might be a useful initiative to help us to get to know one another better and provide a service to the community. I hope representatives from each congregation, maybe three from each, would be willing to attend a meeting in St Mark's to discuss things further and agree the best way forward.

"We believe in the power of prayer to bring change"

This is the watchword of the group Christian Solidarity Worldwide and when I received their latest bulletin recently those words jumped out at me and I thought perhaps they should the watchword for all Christian people and I would commend them particularly to each one of us in Holy Trinity.



When I look back over the past few years and realise how far we have come since we shivered

as we faced the possibility that our building would be put up for sale and our congregation scattered, I am amazed. I know that so many of us have been praying and it seems that, although we are not out of the woods yet, the old hurts have been healed, some of those who were working to destroy us have been silenced, and we have become once more a close, loving, dedicated congregation, each of us worshipping and serving God as best we can and in our own ways. God has not and will not let us down. However shallow our worship and grudging our service, He accepts gladly what we offer, for he knows and understands us so well

Looking at what God has done for us over the past few years, I tell myself that I need to be more thankful for the way he has kept his promises to us and should spend more time with Him which is what prayer actually is. We have a small house group to which anyone is welcome, and perhaps we should consider forming other groups to meet, study and pray simply and quietly together. I sense this is something that parts of the Church of Scotland have lost. Before I came here I belonged to a church where people prayed "at the drop of a hat" as I used to say, simply and without embarrassment, as though God was standing just next to us and sharing in our conversations, as he is, if we ask him in.

Some years ago we used to meet for very informal prayers each weekday morning and I miss that a lot. Praying together is different from one's own private prayers and is, I find, a real help and stimulus. Is God asking

us to pray more? Perhaps we could think about sharing in a prayer group or groups, and if that makes you break out into goose pimples, just think of it as being like having a coffee with friends and sharing it with God. Not scary, and there could well be home made short bread and cake to share too. I guess it was like that when Jesus visited Martha and Mary and Lazarus and they prayed together as I am sure they did.

If anyone would like to share in a house group or a prayer group have a word with Marion or Mike Stewart our Session Clerk, or one of the elders or me, God might be waiting for you to step out. And let's expect great things.

HTAG need volunteers to help steward the large numbers of people who attend these functions - Again- can YOU help? (Ed)






- a new office and prayer room at the West door with a WINDPROOF glass entry foyer, allowing the West doors to be left open and the public to look in.

Short letter from Julie in Columbia

Life as it is...(208)

S and I meet to go to the prison. It has been -8°C overnight and it is still well below freezing point. There is a pile of rubbish on the corner so I stand outside a basement cake shop which will open later. Sharp crying can be heard and I immediately realise there is a baby amid the rubbish.



A nearby workman does not react, but opens a corrugated iron door. I can then see a small girl standing in a doorway crying and shouting "Mamita." I go over to her: she is trembling with cold and has tracks of tears down her cheeks. There is no one else around. I ask where her Mum is?

S. arrives. We think the Mum might have nipped out to get bread from a corner shop.

We wait with the child, who is about three, so that she does not go looking for her Mum and get lost. She says her younger brother is in their room but she refuses to go up the staircase we can see from the doorway and put on warmer clothes and shoes. She is wearing red leggings, a pink high neck jumper with a rabbit holding a heart with I U on it and pink socks. Her hair is in two high plaits from yesterday. She is pale but clean except for sores around her nose and mouth.

The Mum does not appear. S knocks on the neighbours' doors to try to obtain more information. The girl says her Mum does go out and leave them. She leaves them food. S. manages to get a neighbour to open the door but he is coughing heavily without a mask and says there is no one there who could help. No one else answers their doors and no shops on the block are open.

We speculate that perhaps the Mum locks the kids in normally when she goes out to work and that she forgot this morning so the girl was able to get down to the street but we have never seen the street door open when we pass on the way to work.

After half an hour we phone 999 and the operator says they will send a patrol car. A pick-up arrives and a young policewoman gets out. The policewoman talks to the girl and says softly, "I'll lend you a dog" which gets her interest. A small French bulldog puppy on a lead gets out of the vehicle and the girl takes the policewoman's hand. Together they go through the doorway and up the stairs. We take our leave and head down the road.

We phone our colleagues to say we will be late. Today, unusually a bus appears and, having tried unsuccessfully to get a taxi, we take it.
