

THE PARISH CHURCH OF THE HOLY TRINITY: ST ANDREWS

THE CLERESTORY WINDOWS

These windows are the work of Mr. Alexander Strachan, brother of the more famous Dr. Douglas Strachan, who made 14 of the windows in the church. They were gifted to the Church after the First World War, and contain the badges of all the Scottish Regiments, and of certain other Regiments and Branches of the Armed Forces.

WOOD CARVINGS

There is much fine wood-carving in the Church, with that in the Hunter and Memorial Aisle being perhaps the most notable and accessible. The carving of the figures on the foot of the windows should be noted.

The least accessible carving, and the most colourful, is on the ceiling of the Channel and Nave:

THE CENTRE BOSSES there are of scenes from the Life of Christ. THE BOSSES OF THE SIDE ROWS are of Old Testament subjects.
