EDITOR'S NOTES

Dear All,

It has been a long time since the last newsletter and a lot is now happening. Following the formation of the new Presbytery of Fife, we have a new trajectory, emanating from the General assembly, but enthusiastically being pursued by our new Presbytery Clerk, David Coulter and the Mission director, Neil (who at one time was a member of this congregation). We also have new Deputy Session Clerk, Mike Carslaw, for which I am very grateful. There is a very clear timeline (see below) for the rearrangements that will be necessary if not only the Presbytery, but the whole of the Church of Scotland are to move forward. The priorities now lie in the direction of **Outreach** and **working with other churches** in the community. We are being asked to give our views as to the future and, although, as our cover picture shows, the road ahead is not clear, we, in Holy Trinity are doing our utmost to ensure the best for us as a congregation. Your session are



working hard to put the most positive view forward and we have had a very positive meeting with the Presbytery and the General Trustees. There are definitely 'New Brooms' at work.

Did you notice the patch of blue sky in the cover picture?

On a parallel track, the Holy Trinity action group (HTAG), which comprises folk from the congregation and a number of influential members of the St Andrews community are progressing with the formation of a trust which could become the owner of our wonderful building and relieve the Church of Scotland of the responsibility for its future. As Graham Wynd, the chairman, says below, we will be having a number of meetings of the congregation between now and Christmas so that all are informed and all views are taken. At the congregational level, we are not letting the grass grow under our feet. In addition to the new boilers and it is likely that the choir will be reforming this month improvements in the hall under Walter's direction. We now host two 'homeless' congregations; the Free Church in the hall for two services on a Sunday and Kingdom Vineyard in the church on Sunday evenings. Both of these congregations are in the main young, enthusiastic Christians who fill the venues with worship. The Holiday Club, held in the grounds of Canongate Primary School was a huge success and Little Cherubs has restarted now that COVID is receding, and now meets in the Church hall. One area where we are lacking are those of 21st century audiovisual facilities in the main building and this is also being addressed.

However, nothing will succeed without more involvement of all of us in prayer and discipleship training. This is a joint responsibility and I would encourage all of you to commit to these activities, in small groups with your areas, so that we can truly become, as Cameron Harrison once coined the strap-line:

"A church at the heart of St Andrews with St Andrews at its heart"

In a 1992 Reader's Digest article entitled 'The Ultimate Key to Success' Suzanne Chazin wrote,

Persistent people know they can succeed where more able people fail ... Successful people understand that no one makes it to the top in a single bound. What truly sets them apart is their willingness to keeping putting one foot in front of the other – no matter how rough the terrain.


From our interim Moderator

TEACH US TO NUMBER OUR DAYS

The Pandemic has brought so much suffering and distress to many people, change to our national and ecclesiastical life, things will never be the same as we have seen from the pulpits of several congregations. Will we recover the vitality of our former life together? Time will tell.

Despite these changes, the Pandemic has also taught us two very important things. The first is the fragility of life. How can an invisibly small virus cause so much disturbance to our world and despite the best efforts of our scientific community persist in tormenting us with its changing forms?

As a consequence of this, we return to the songs of the Psalmist and his famous prayer, 'Teach us to number our days.' He has already told us that our years are three score and ten and four score for those who are strong. Our time is limited. Covid 19 has made this very clear.



The second is the importance of working together. The scientific community have led us to appreciate this wisdom although governments haven't been as quick to realise it, sometimes playing the one against the other for pitiful political advantage. This inevitably causes division and a squandering of resources.

Back to the song of the Psalmist who prays, 'Teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.' He has just illustrated how vulnerable we are as human beings and compared our vulnerability with the powerfulness of God. To live wisely is to acknowledge the truth of this perspective.

In the conclusion of his ninetieth song, the Psalmist asks that God will reveal his work to his people and 'establish the work of our hands'. Our work is vocational. It begins and ends in God. We are only able to discern this together. Beware the individual who is overly confident about what God says! It's a discernment which belongs to everyone not the one however saintly they appear to be.

The Pandemic has revealed another very important thing. The importance of change to our survival. Isn't this what Covid 19 has been doing in a remarkably efficient and admirable way? It changes its form in order to survive and it changes itself very quickly. The Church needs to learn this lesson too.

The Kirk Session at Holy Trinity has been mindful of this. In Autumn 2020, the Kirk Session wrote to the Presbytery in response to the Goring Report. It voted with sizeable majorities on four matters – ministry, linkage with Boarhills and Dunino, a Presbytery Mission Initiative and an Audit of St. Andrews.

Through discussion with the ministers at 'Hope Park and Martyrs' and 'St. Leonards' and in consultation with the newly appointed Mission Director of the Presbytery of Fife, all three Kirk Sessions were invited to participate in the Audit of St. Andrews and to finance it to a tune of £1,000 each. I am delighted to say that all three agreed to this proposal.

Although the Audit was not part of the Goring Report, it grew out of the Presbytery's discussion of it. In the minute, Presbytery instructed its Strategy and Resourcing Committee 'to seek resources, with local collaboration and involvement, in order to undertake a full mission audit of the town of St. Andrews with a view to identifying the areas of the town (geographical and social) where a new church presence is required ...'

Although various groups within Presbytery discussed this motion, nothing has come of it until our three Kirk Sessions decided to work on it together. Brendan Research have been appointed to do the audit. Dr. Fiona Tweedie and Dr. Rita Welsh have already begun and will submit their report in December.

The beauty of this initiative is that it isn't about buildings and readjustment per se but about the people of St. Andrews and an acknowledgement that the ministry to the town belongs not just to one person, one congregation or even one denomination but to all the Christian folk in our midst.

This ministry and mission is a corporate responsibility. How best can we do this together? What will the Audit reveal about the town – its age profile, its social divisions, its addiction to drugs, its view of the church, its provision for young people, its distribution of resources Independent consultants, which are themselves members of the Kirk, will share their findings with us.

In addition, the three Kirk Sessions also agreed that widespread discussion of the Audit would be essential for our future. Recognising that we couldn't do this very easily nor dispassionately on our own, the Kirk Sessions all agreed that the Kirk's independent facilitators, 'Place of Hope', should be responsible for enabling our discussion. This comes at no cost to us.

The Audit and its discussion will help us to work together with our fellow Christians in the other two kirks. This, in itself, will be an opportunity to refocus our attention away from current issues involving buildings and readjustment to the real purpose of the church to minister to those whose need is great.

Acknowledging that this is a ministry which belongs not just to Holy Trinity but to others as well is a significant beginning. I am sure many myths about the town and about the other congregations will be surprisingly and happily challenged and greater clarity of thought and purpose will be gained.

Above all, it is my prayer that in acknowledging our corporate responsibility 'to bring the ordinances of religion to the people of Scotland' that we will rekindle old friendships and, more significantly, make new friendships across our parish boundaries that we may value our time together, resolve to work collaboratively and discern the wisdom of God which can only be done together

Jesus Calms the Storm on the Lake

St Mark 4 vv 1 - 2, 35 - 41

He went back to teaching by the sea. A crowd built up to such a size that he had to get into an offshore boat, using the boat as a pulpit as the people pushed to the water's edge. He taught by using stories, many stories. Late that day he said to them, Let's go across to the other side. They took him in the boat as he was. Other boats came along.

(The Message)

1. Are the characters in the picture so overwhelmed, so fearful that they're choosing to ignore the incoming storm

that is already darkening their picnic?

2. Or are they gearing up, nourishing themselves for the effort and courage needed, having believed Jesus' teaching about a new way of living in his name?
Which scene do you belong to? Which scene does your church belong to?

A huge storm came up. Waves poured into the boat, threatening to sink it. And Jesus was in the stern, head on a pillow, sleeping! They roused him, saying, Teacher, is it nothing to you that we are going do? (The Message)

1. Is Jesus able to sleep through the storm because he knows he's taught them all that they'll need to navigate difficult times?



2. Are the disciples in danger, are they part of the problem because they're too scared to remember Jesus' teaching, and apply it when a change of tack, when courage are calling?

How are you feeling and behaving?

How is your church feeling and behaving in these storm filled times?

Awake now, he told the wind to pipe down and said to the sea, Quiet! Settle down! The wind ran out of breath; the sea became smooth as glass. Jesus reprimanded the disciples: Why are you such cowards? Don't you have any faith at all? They were in absolute awe, staggered. Who is this anyway, they asked? Wind and sea at his beck and call?

(The Message)

- 1. Are the characters holding their tools as weapons to resist, fight and defend their lives against any possibility of change?
- 2. Or is the women using her phone to navigate new waters, new landscapes? Are the men exited and full of trepidation all at once, holding the necessary tools to carve and create their new life in Christ? How are you preparing for life in Christ in new times? Which tools do you need and why? As you take control of your future with Jesus notice how the stormy horizon becomes filled with light and possibility.

FABRIC AND FINANCE

I thought I would pen a few lines to update all congregation members with up to the minute conditions and on-going works within our church properties, so here goes –:

<u>CHURCH</u> – The most significant project has been the very recent installation of two new boilers. I know, other than feeling the heat in the church virtually no one has seen our boilers! We have a 'boiler room' away in the dungeons of the church, in a door opposite the lower toilets. The last boilers were well in excess of 30 years old and had for quite a few years become excessively expensive to run. The Scottish Gas engineer at his annual inspection always commented on how we were providing the seagulls with lots of heat! Meaning all the heat was going up the flue! Around one third savings is the estimated amount on our gas bills and the optimistic calculation is the savings will bring us to a break even point in around 7 or 8 years......I am honoured to have been the property convener who over-saw this installation.

Moving the pews

It has been suggested, and awaits session approval, that we:

- 1 Make a further two pairs of pews moveable in the central section of the nave, this time fitting them with jacking castors so that they can be moved without having to lift them onto a trolley.
- 2 Fit the already moveable pews in the central section of the nave with jacking castors so that they can be moved without having to lift them onto a trolley. (It might be thought economical to redo the Ministers' Stalls at the same time for aesthetic reasons?)
- 3 Make the set of pews which sit in front of the Playfair Aisle closest to the pulpit moveable with jacking castors, so that easy access to the Playfair Aisle space is possible for moving staging, musical instruments and other equipment in and out. Slightly more complicated carpentry would be required here as the pews are built into a wooden screen, though it is thought that a fairly straightforward and neat solution would be possible.

So, what else at the church, I am not going to mention the dreaded Covid-19 limitations.....

An annual clearing of weeds from our roofs will be completed soon now that the seagull-breeding season is behind us. We had a couple of small repairs to the tower clock last year and I am amazed at how perfect the clock works and keeps time. All the usual legal inspections continue, electrical, gas, fire extinguishers, etc etc. I am very pleased to work alongside John Taylor who is the real Jack of ALL trades!!


We are continuing to review the Covid guidelines and will soon increase our allowable attendance to 41 from 28.



Some of the historical covers were highlighted this month: This one celebrates the reunion of the the divide churches in 1929




Tite and Work continued publishing monthly throughout both World Wars. Since 187 the only issues if her missed were due to a printers' strike in summer 1950.

Sharing in God's service

I was listening to Marion reading the daily Bible reading on U-Tube recently. It was Isaiah's call to God's service in Isaiah chapter 6 and as she reached his response to God's question 'Whom shall I send and who will go for us?' she raised her eyes from the page and said in a clear strong voice:

"Here am I send me!"

When, in the brief prayer that followed, she said: "Lord when we hear you calling us help us to be as willing as he was to answer his call to service", I found myself thinking about how God calls us to share in his work in the world.

Not many of us will have had the terrifying, literally earth-shaking call Isaiah experienced, but if like Marion you offer yourself for full-time ministry in the Church you will have been asked to justify your vocation and to show in all sorts of ways that you truly believe God has called you into his full-time service.

For the rest of us, the call will have come in many different ways and we will probably never have been asked to justify it, but, as members of his church, I am sure that God does call us to his service and wants us to respond.

Not everyone is called to preach or to write or do great works, but I believe that God has work for each of us to do. Some of us know exactly what it is and take it on to the best of our ability, others see a need and do their best to fill it. Many of us would be surprised to be told that the things we "just do" – making a bit more soup and taking it to a sick or elderly neighbour, offering to look after a friend's children or handicapped relative so he or she can have a break, serving tea at a church fete or saying "I could do that" when a post needs to be filled – are part of God's call to us and are just as valuable in his eyes.

Why not spend a few minutes thinking about your life and asking yourself just how you are fulfilling God's purpose for you in it. Ask yourself who would miss out if you weren't there? Perhaps you are already doing God's work without realising it. Then sit quietly and ask him for his guidance — has he more work for you, or is he asking you to act differently, or is he saying "Well done"? And if you're still uncertain find someone who lives close to God and whom you trust and ask for help. God often uses other people to give us his messages.

(Keeping thumb pads together, uncurl fingers and wiggle them.)





(Spring fingers and thumbs free – so hands end up open, facing upwards)



A very personal Book review


I don't know very many Christian authors, but I do know Derek Puffett, who was a huge influence in the lives of myself and Moira when in South Africa.

These are often attended by those, unable for whatever reason, to join us at our Sunday morning services. We have been delighted to welcome people of all ages – at a service recently, three generations of one family!


Short Service of Communion

If you were passing by Canongate school between the 10th -14th of August, you might have wondered what on earth was going on in the playground... adults were being pied in the face with shaving foam pies, kids were jumping around like jungle animals, and there was a great deal of noise as kids yelled out the letters

J-E-S-U-S, YES!

Well, it wasn't the circus in town, just a group of children's workers, from several different churches in St Andrews, coming together to share the good news about Jesus, with a large group of children.



As 'Jungle Julie', my role was to get the kids moving- singing songs, playing games, and having fun! We

had obstacle courses to navigate, we played games of 'pull the tail from the monkey', we searched for treasure, we developed team chants and we made beautiful crafts. Our theme

song was, 'Who's the King of the Jungle?', which was a real hit, with children yelling out J-E-S-U-S, YES! He's the king of me!" At the top of their voices.

Over the course of the 4 mornings, children learned that the Bible is full of lots of little stories that make up one big story. The children heard how Jesus performed lots of amazing miracles, he calmed a storm and filled boats full of fish, but as he grew popular the people in charge became cross. They came up with a plan to kill him, and they nailed him to a cross.

Jesus died. But that wasn't the end of the story! Jesus came back to life!

The children learned that Jesus invites them to be his

followers and that they are loved always, even when they mess up and get things wrong, The children listened intently and their questions during discussion times were so insightful.



We averaged 76 children per day, with a total of 93 children attending. Parents and carers were appreciative of the efforts made, and we had lots of positive feedback.

Please pray that the seeds that have been sown would not be stolen away, but that they would grow and flourish and produce fruit. Pray that the children would remember that they are loved, that they are special, and that they can be a friend and follower of Jesus.


HOLY TRINITY ACTION GROUP

Kingdom Vineyard run the Storehouse food bank

Storehouse is a foodbank serving the most vulnerable people in our community of NE Fife. It was set up in 2006 by Kingdom Vineyard church, serving people of any faith or no faith, and ever since we have been giving out bags of food and toiletries to individuals or families who are in crisis and are unable to provide for themselves. They may have lost their job, been through a family break up, be the victims of domestic violence, or had their



benefits delayed or suspended. In desperate times we are able to meet their immediate need for food and extend God's kindness to them.



Every Thursday we run drop-in sessions for those who are struggling to come and receive food. We aim to run these sessions in the most welcoming way we can. We try our best to work in such a way that means you only receive the food that you like and have chosen yourself. Our team is almost all made up of volunteers who are trained to help you get everything you need and make you feel welcomed and at ease. Storehouse also partners with other agencies, sending pre-packed bags of food to them to distribute.

We are always deeply saddened that the need for foodbanks is continuously on the rise, however we feel really blessed to be able to carry out the work we do with the generous support of others.

Thanks to all the generous donations of money and goods Holy Trinity supplied some 523 bags(of the 3462 total for Storehouse) to Ron Cuickshanks 07763210434
