MARION'S PASTORAL LETTER

Dear friends,

As I write, we are now halfway through the season of Lent, and the joy of Easter is just around the corner. I must say that it hardly seems possible that the year is passing so quickly. But the lighter evenings and the daffodils in the garden, the swelling buds on the trees, new lambs in the fields, and even the warmth in the sunshine all testify to the new life that really is springing up all around us. This is such a lovely time of year.

I want to share with you a beautiful old story about a Sunday School teacher who asked the children in his class to bring plastic eggs to church on Easter Sunday He asked then to fill each one with something that symbolised the meaning of Easter to them. The great day came, and the teacher took each child's egg in turn, opening it up and making a point of amplifying and reinforcing the meaning of its contents. One child brought a beautiful tiny flower in her egg, and the teacher spoke about the new life that springs up at Easter. Another egg contained a crayoned picture of Jesus Christ, and the teacher spoke about his life and all that he has done for us. Another egg contained a small nail, and so the teacher spoke about the nails that had fastened Jesus to the cross on Good Friday. Yet another egg contained a round pebble, this to represent the stone that was rolled away from the tomb on Easter Day.


However, the teacher was quite dumbfounded when he opened the egg of seven-year-old Brian, a boy with learning difficulties, for his egg was completely empty. But he need not have worried, for Brian spoke up for himself and announced in a loud voice 'My egg is full of emptiness, just like the tomb of Jesus, for Jesus is alive.'

As we walk the way of the cross with Jesus during Lent and Holy Week, we remember all the things that happened to him, all that he was prepared to do for us. But let us never forget that the whole point of it all is that at Easter Jesus defeats sin and death for us, and as a result he will always be very much alive. And because he lives, we have hope both for this life and the life to come.

The latest summary from Rev Alan McCafferty

"The G12 (A group of four people from each of the three churches) has now met on 5 occasions and is making satisfactory progress.

So far we have agreed a Vision* (see below) of what we are about and from that are making progress toward a

Mission Statement that will outline our priorities when we unite which we need to submit to Presbytery by **30 June 2023.**



We are in the process of exchanging data about the ways our churches are constituted and the financial comparisons. We have heard about the relationship between Holy Trinity's congregation and the Holy Trinity St Andrews Trust and are discussing the implications for the united Kirk Session and congregation.

The Church of Scotland has published its **Basis of Team Ministry** and Unions and we shall next be working towards appropriate wordings for those for which we shall seek your approval.

At the same time we are beginning to shape the responsibilities, size, leadership roles and other aspects of how the new Kirk Session might operate.

We meet again on 30 March.

*Vision Statement

'St Andrews:XXXX (The name of the joint congregation has yet to be agreed) aspires to be a vibrant, intergenerational, God-focused, prayerful, worshipping community. We hope people will see we are inclusive, warm and friendly to all. We feel we have much to contribute to the St Andrews community, and offer everyone the opportunity to share in a loving, hospitable, welcoming and open group of people who are Jesus' disciples. We want to show how we care for those in need in our midst, in the wider world, and care for the environment, by sharing our gifts and talents.

THOUGHTS 1

You don't need a 'phone to talk to God

I had a telephone consultation with my GP recently and though I think we are getting better at communicating at a distance I expect we both miss the clues we pick up when we talk to people face to face. Thinking about this later made me wonder how the disciples felt when, after the Resurrection, Jesus ascended into heaven and left them leaderless. He told them to wait in Jerusalem for His Holy Spirit, but I wonder if they had any idea of what He meant by that. I'd like to have been a fly on the wall in the room where they met.



For us, the problem with God has always been that although He did communicate with His people and used them as messengers He rarely appeared in person and then insisted that they hide from His face. That is why I find it so amazing that He sent Jesus to live with us on earth. A real flesh and blood person that everyone could see and touch and talk to. Just like having a face to face consultation with one's doctor instead of a 'phone call.

Reading about the arrival of the Holy Spirit that day in Jerusalem and the effect it had on Jesus' disciples and those around them, I realise that although the only physical signs of a presence were the tongues of flame and rushing wind, something very surprising happened. Jesus was no longer with them in the flesh but God was somehow in touch with His people and continued to communicate with them, and, later, us, in all kinds of ways, mostly in our hearts and minds but also by signs and wonders and happenings. It's easy for us 2000 years later to dismiss it as imagination and wishful thinking, but all the evidence over the years of God's communication with his people should make us stop and ask ourselves whether He really is in touch with us and waiting for us to respond. Not everyone sees visions or hears voices but, when we look back in faith, so often what seemed to be just good luck or a happy coincidence made it possible for us to do exactly what God was asking us to do or gave us exactly what He knew we had asked for and needed. That's Faith. Not blind faith but an active Faith that looks out for the signs that God is on our case and answering our prayers.

If you have been a worshipper in Holy Trinity for the past six years or more I am sure you will know how fearful and depressed many of us were about the future of our congregation and building. Rumours around the town were that Holy Trinity was to be put up for sale to the highest bidder and that our congregation would be disbanded. People began to lose heart and the congregation began to dwindle. It was a difficult time for us but we kept going and kept praying though

perhaps without much hope. How do you feel about our future now? Are you still waiting for the For Sale notices to go up? Have you felt a sense of hope and optimism as you have shared in Sunday worship and helped with all the caring work and outreach which is taking place here? I know I am not the only person who believes that God is answering our prayers and is working out His plan for Not sure? Still feeling threatened? us in our town. Not too sure about miracles? We've been through testing times so I understand completely. But what I'd ask everyone to do, if you haven't already, is to look back over the last few years and see how every time we have had a job to fill or needed help or had a problem that seemed impossible to solve, help has been at hand. I could list the ways the gaps have been filled: we needed an organist and Walter Blair stepped in, he became ill and sadly died, and Marjorie Bruce stepped in. Where do you find a secretary and a treasurer who knows about churches and is ready to work for us? Those posts are filled. How do we raise enough money to keep our building wind and water tight and warm - step forward Graham Wynd and his team, how to keep our church hall sparkling bright - enter Steve Watson, our garden blooming, and our pastoral care and safeguarding group fulfilling their remit,... I could go on, but Mike says space is limited, so don't think you are forgotten. Whatever you do, know that God has called you or just nudged you into the work you are doing for him here. And one person I can't miss out, the one who told me once "I am sure I am in the place God wants me to be" with humble pride, the one who is working tirelessly in His service to teach, enthuse and lead us - Marion. We can't see into the future but can look to the recent past and see how God is working and be full of hope.

You don't need a landline or a mobile or tablet to contact God. He's never offline, his batteries never run out of power, and he's never too busy or too tired or too angry with you to listen and help. He can reach us even in the pit of despair. This congregation has been there and found God at work.

St Andrews Free church

As most of you will know, the Free church have been using our church hall for some years for two services on a Sunday.

They have of the order of 250 folk attending the two services, most of whom are young. This has been a most amicable arrangement, largely brokered between Steve Watson for the practical arrangements and Granger Brash for the legal aspects. In particular, there is now a new sound system being installed, which will benefit all users. There are also new chairs and, soon, tables which will make life easier for moving between 'tenants'.

The contract for use of the hall has now been renegotiated and extended for 5 years years from 1 Feb 2024, but if things change re the St Andrews cluster then there will be opportunities for both parties to revisit the contract

AN UPDATE FROM THE HOLY TRINITY ST ANDREWS TRUST

Priority Development Projects (New Toilets and Disabled Access)

The Church's request to Presbytery's Property Task Group to approve expenditure of up to £37k on a Feasibility Study has been submitted. The contract will be between the Church and the professional firms involved, with the Trust acting as Session's agent on the project, overseeing its implementation and keeping Session informed of progress and issues.

The professional firms involved are being mobilised to start work. Completion of the feasibility study is expected within about three months of commencing.




Events

Boarhills and Dunino

The basis of union between our two congregations has been agreed by both Kirk sessions and will be put to the congregations in May.

The basis of Union has been accepted by the Presbytery and is shown below.



BASIS OF UNION

The congregation of Boarhills and Dunino Parish Church of Scotland (SC001108) and the congregation of The Parish Church of the Holy Trinity, St. Andrews (Church of Scotland) (SC017173) shall be united on 1 July 2023 or from a date to be determined by Presbytery, and that on the following terms and conditions:

- 1. **Name:** The name of the united congregation shall be Boarhills, Dunino and Holy Trinity, St Andrews Church of Scotland and SC017173 will be retained.
- 2. **Transference of Property and Funds:** The property and funds belonging to or held on behalf of each congregation shall belong to or be held on behalf of the united congregation and any transference necessary shall be duly effected.
- 3. **Places of Worship:** Both churches at present used and occupied by the congregations shall be the places of worship of the united congregation. Services shall be conducted in Dunino Church and in Holy Trinity Church each Sunday at times to be decided by the Minister and Kirk Session, subject to the approval of Presbytery.
- 4. **Territorial Responsibility:** The bounds to be served by the united charge shall be designated as the bounds of the parishes of Boarhills and Dunino and St. Andrews: Holy Trinity or as the Presbytery shall determine.
- 5. **Kirk Session:** The elders of both Kirk Sessions shall form with the minister or ministers the Kirk Session of the united congregation.
- 6. **Congregational Management:** The temporal affairs of the united congregation shall be administered by the Kirk Session in terms of the Unitary Constitution, the Delegation of Assembly being authorised to issue the appropriate Deed of Constitution to the said congregation.
- 7. **Minister:** The united charge will be under the Guardianship of the Presbytery with an interimmoderator and locum minister until such times as readjustment is effected in the St. Andrews' Cluster.
- 8. **Manse:** The manse of the congregation of St. Andrews: Holy Trinity shall be the manse of the united congregation.
- 9. **Ministerial Support:** The stipend of the charge shall be paid in accordance with the terms of the National Stipend Scheme.
- 10. Power to Readjust: While the articles and terms shall form the Basis of Union for the two congregations now uniting, the united congregation shall be free, like other congregations, to adjust arrangements under the authority of Presbytery as need may arise.

Thoughts 2

Heaven isn't far. It's just over the hill. I'm still climbing. It's a road full of rocks, ruts, rubble, and obstacles of all kinds. But it's just over the hill, It's not far. I seem to have been climbing forever (most of my life, as it happens). Heaven isn't far.

For Jesus heaven wasn't far. All that stood before Him was the cross. It wasn't far, but the road was tortuous, long, and lonely. "Father, why have you abandoned me? Where are You?" The Father was silent for a time. Christ had to suffer on His own. All by Himself He had to carry the burden of the world's sin, shame, pain, and guilt. Jesus was the one called to bear it, the One who had never known sin, guilt, or shame. He had to carry it all, for everyone.

Then God showed His hand. A shroud of darkness covered the land. The temple sanctuary, reserved only for the privileged few, shuddered and was exposed to the world. The dividing curtain was ripped from top to bottom to allow access to all. The earth shook and, with a mighty roar, rocks were split apart. The tombs of the dead were opened and bodies of the faithful were brought to life (Matthew 27:52).

A loud voice cried out, clear and triumphant. "It is finished." The journey was over, and the glory was yet to come.

It's just over the hill. It's not too far. Are we ready? Many have lost the way. Many more don't even know there *is* a way. And many, many more are going the wrong way. How can we know the way? How do we find it?

Jesus found it. He beat down all opposition and endured many hardships to find it. So, the way has been walked already. Jesus said, "Follow me." To find it we must follow Him, although not through all the heartache and pain and suffering He endured. That has already been done for us. That's what the cross was all about. But we are to follow Him, He who is pure, righteous and victorious. He said, "I am the way."

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28). With Him we're almost there. It's just over the hill.


Are we struggling with our heavy load? Are we carrying baggage that He has already carried and disposed of? He took all our pain and sorrows. Have we given him our hatred, bitterness, and anger? He carried all that too. In fact, as we acknowledge all our sins before Him, they are already dealt with – crucified with Christ.

Let's go with Him, beyond the cross, leaving our past behind, and accept His invitation. "Come, follow me." We're almost there. It's just over the hill.



Book Reviews

"God save the King"



With the Coronation happening soon, a new book by our own Rev Ian Bradley is due to be published early in May. This is a masterly work, which displays the depth and breadth of knowledge that Ian has with regard to both the biblical origins of monarchy and the History of this British institution which is at the heart of our nation.

I can do no better in a few words than to say that the sections cover Kingship in both the old and new testaments, a description of how closely the English, and later British monarchy was modelled on this (Something that comes over clearly when the liturgy of the coronation is described detail) and the place of

monarchy in the contemporary United Kingdom.

Of particular interest is the relationship, often stormy, of the monarchy with the church and how, post the Reformation, we have come to a settled relationship in both England and Scotland. This is an easy read, containing many detailed facts and allusions of which I was unaware. I can thoroughly recommend it.


AN BRADLEY

Thoughts (3)

Truth and Lies

We read in John 8:32: 'You will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.'

But we get caught up in certain mindsets that we believe to be the truth and then we live by them. These mindsets, or beliefs, are formed over the years until they become a part of us. As we grow up, we receive a lot of input from our families, communities, and culture, (which may be quite different from those of other people).

Often, we don't think of questioning the way things are done or the values that are lived by in our own family, community, or culture, but there is a verse in the Bible which says, 'My people are ruined because they don't know what's right or true'.*The Message

This can happen when people see a family pattern as the truth, and 'own' it for themselves. For instance, they might say something like, "Our family is known for short tempers and impatience. That's just how it is." or "This family is prone to accidents and early deaths."

Apart from these family influences, traumatic events can also shape and influence our personal beliefs.

So often people aren't even open for discussion about these beliefs. But here are the main questions we need to ask.

"Is this God's truth, or your own 'truth'? Whom are you believing? What does God's Word say about this?"

Try to imagine a filing cabinet with three drawers, or an online filing system with different folders, and think of each drawer or folder containing files labelled 'truth', 'lies', or 'unsure'.

Sometimes we file something in the 'truth' drawer and believe it as such, but if we ask God about it, He might show us that it belongs in the 'lies' drawer. For example, we might believe ourselves to be unworthy of love because of how we have been treated, but this is not God's truth about us. Or maybe we aren't convinced that God really cares about us, and we place that thought in the 'unsure' drawer.



There will always be a scripture showing us God's truth for every one of our situations. 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

Overseas outreach

Angel Tree report from Julie

S. asked me to go with her to look for one of the Angel Tree families whose kids have not returned to the project and who are not answering the phone. The mum is in the prison sentenced for murder and so the Dad and step-mum look after the two small boys. As the Dad drinks, it is mostly the young step mum who is responsible for the boys and she has a baby boy of her own who is a few months old.

We had been told the family had moved to a cheap lodging place where an ex-nightclub had been turned into a confusion of small rooms for rent. It is known as the "Vecindad del Chavo" (after the famous Mexican TV series). We walked several blocks around the address we had been given asking at every little "corner" shop but no one had heard of it.

As a last resort, S. phoned one of the other Angel Tree Mums who lives nearby and, despite being under the influence of drugs, she was able to tell us immediately and accurately where the place was (we were one street too far south and three blocks too far west) but she asked why S. wanted to go there and told her it was dangerous.

With V.'s directions we found the place easily. The nightclub sign still hung from the front of the building and a constant stream of people came in and out of garage doors open onto the street. There was a girl cleaning at the entrance, who turned out to be the caretaker, and we told her we were looking for someone we thought lived there. She knew the family and we waited on the street while she went to look for LD.

Often tourists describe areas of Bolivian cities as slums which are not slums, but the glimpse we had into the squalid patio with its tiny rooms merited no other description.

LD. came out with the baby. She showed signs of a recent beating. Seeing us was a surprise but she was happy and went back in to get the boys.

S. and I sat on a low window ledge and LD. squatted next to us with the baby. The two boys ran around wildly and fought with another boy who had come out to see who we were. The younger boy was particularly violent. The children ran in and out of the busy road and narrowly escaped being hit by cars and minibuses. They are not attending school as by the time LD. got round to going to register them, the school in the north near where they lived before, had closed the lists for this semester. She now needs to wait until at least the middle of the semester to apply for them to be admitted to a school nearer to where they are living.

LD.'s options seem limited. She would like to out of the "Vecindad del Chavo" but has not got enough resources. She would like to leave her partner but as she does not have any legal papers saying she is responsible for the boys she would have to leave them too and she does not want to do that. The boys' mum will be in prison until they are adults and is not able to help her out much. The boys' father will not let her leave and take them with her.

We prayed with her and encouraged her to bring the boys to Angel Tree when she can.

'A 'and his partner had been heroin addicts. They were befriended by the Breakfast@Trinity family and encouraged to join us for worship and at social events. Their progress was rocky, but gradually improved. He made a commitment to follow Jesus and was baptised in the sea by Cameron. He and his partner agreed to get married and we provided both the wedding in the H&M aisle and a reception. They seemed to be progressing well; but sadly the damage done during their time on drugs left both with considerable difficulties and we heard last week that he had died, at the age of only 42.

This was a couple in OUR town, whom we tried to help, but failed after Breakfast@Trinity closed. In the street one day they said to me "When is Breakfast at Trinity starting up again?" I had to tell them that there were no plans at present.

Could we have done more? Of course we could, but it needs a team of us, committed to help those in desperate need. ARE WE READY TO TAKE UP THIS CHALLENGE ONCE OUR CONGREGATIONS UNITE



Please don't put it in the waste paper basket-Why not offer it to that friend who you really wish would come to church with you?




