



Another year, another newsletter.



MARION'S PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends,

The story goes that back during World War 2 a little American boy and his daddy were driving home on Christmas Eve. On the way they drove past rows of houses with Christmas trees and decorations in the windows. In many of the windows the little boy noticed a star. He asked his father "Daddy, why do some of the people have a star in the window? His daddy told him that the star meant that the



family had a son away fighting in the war. As they passed the last house, suddenly the little boy caught sight of a very bright star in the dark sky. 'Look Daddy' he said, 'God must have a son in the war He's got a star in his window too!

At this time of year when we celebrate the birth of the Son of God as a little child, it is important that we remember, amidst all the hype of the season, that the real reason for the season is that Jesus came into our world to go to war with sin. The land in which Jesus was born was at the time an occupied land with all that implies for the people of his day. They felt uncomfortable in their own country and God saw that the time was right to send the Saviour of the world.

There must be many in our own country, as well as other parts, who feel uncomfortable in the world in which we are all called to live. Just think of those who live in Ukraine and other war-torn countries, as well as those who live with extreme poverty, and those in our own land who are dreading the coming months and having to deal with the financial crisis we all face. In so many ways in our own day, love has been replaced by law, and so many people find this impersonal situation difficult to deal with.

Last Sunday we began our service with the introit, 'Love came down at Christmas' a beautiful poem by Christine Rossetti which says

Love came down at Christmas, love all lovely, Love divine; Love was born at Christmas; star and angels gave the sign.

Worship we the Godhead, Love incarnate, Love divine; worship we our Jesus, but wherewith for sacred sign?

Love shall be our token; love be yours and love be mine; love to God and others, love for plea and gift and sign.

The greatest and most effective weapon in the war against sin is love. It was in love that God sent his son to a needy world to do something about it. Our Christmas should always be a celebration of the love of God for all people. So as part of the family of the people of God in this place, let us do all that we can to reflect that love for all people in every way we can this Christmas.

UNITED WE STAND

Since I last wrote about the prospective union with St. Leonard's and St. Mark's, there have been three significant events.

The first was a joint meeting of all three Kirk Sessions on 5 October. This was moderated by the Revd. Nigel Watson and the Revd. Sarah Moore who have been working with us under 'Place for Hope'.

Discussion was focused on two areas — buildings and governance. A straightforward analysis of the three buildings emerged. Attention focused on size, hall accommodation, toilet facilities, parking etc. There were no surprises and some people were generous in their assessment of the buildings of the other churches.



In the discussion on governance, two opportunities were celebrated. *The one was to change the structure of the united Kirk Session.*

By and large, elders favoured a smaller Kirk Session with elders serving for limited terms and the membership rotating among the united pool of elders. The aging profile of the eldership was acknowledged.

The other was to value the increased pool of talent with all the attendant gifts and ideas which the union would bring. Issues which needed to be considered carefully were communication across the united parish, pastoral care, the nature of a Pioneer Ministry, the consolidation of finances and other administrative functions.

To this end, three people from each congregation would form a working group along with the two prospective ministers, Graeme Beebee and Allan McCafferty, working under the chairmanship of an independent person not involved in the life of the church in St. Andrews – a Group of Twelve!

It is hoped that this working group will bring forward a 'Basis of Union'. This will require to be approved by the Presbytery and voted on by each of the three Kirk Sessions and congregations, hopefully this Eastertide. In the meantime, a series of joint services will enable members to meet each other and see the different worship spaces.

(The Holy Trinity representatives are Mike Carslaw, Ron Cruickshanks and Julie Torrance.)

The second significant event which has happened was the approval of the Presbytery Mission Plan at the meeting of the Presbytery of Fife on 19 November. This was the third time that the Presbytery Plan had been approved but on this occasion it came with the approval of General Assembly committees.

There was a surprise for Holy Trinity. Faith Nurture Forum, a constituted forum of the General Assembly, sent some additional comments to accompany this third reading of the Plan. Some were specifically for Holy Trinity and were written by the General Trustees who are the owners of our Church building but not our Hall. I reproduce them in full:

Para 7. Holy Trinity Church

- I. attainment of an updated Professional Report (Quinquennial)
- II. details how any repairs identified in the above are to be programmed and resourced
- III. further information should be provided to justify the retention of the building. This should include an assessment of the financial viability and demonstration of community use of the building.
- IV. updates should be provided on the progress of the Holy Trinity Action Group.
- V. The GTs are unlikely to accept any application for central funding for this building until its financial viability is clarified. It is noted that the building is desirable to third parties.

The first two related to the condition of the building. We have a Quinquennial from 2015, a detailed architectural survey from 2021 and a more recent Electrical Installation Condition Report, all of which confirm the view that our building is in very good condition. If another survey is undertaken, we have nothing to fear.

The third relates to the justification of retaining the Holy Trinity building. The Presbytery recently allocated the building with an A category. This was after a Presbytery-wide survey using criteria specifically drawn up by the General Trustees! These comments cannot diminish the grading which the Presbytery

has allocated. There is no A minus or B plus, just an A or a B. And Holy Trinity is in category A.

Category A buildings are 'to be retained beyond the five years from the date at which the Mission Plan is approved or annually reviewed.'

The last clause contains the sentence, 'It is noted that the building is desirable to third parties.' I suspect this relates to the University but it is an absurd comment given that the Kirk Session was instrumental in setting up the Holy Trinity Trust precisely to enable that body to purchase the building!

In may have seemed unfortunate to some that the General Trustees chose to send these comments to the Presbytery precisely at the point when Holy Trinity was engaged in sensitive negotiations with its neighbouring parishes.

Two things have to be recognised to put their comments into context.

In the first place, they were simply comments from the General Trustees and they were simply noted by the Presbytery. They had no effect of changing the status of the newly categorised building nor the content of the Presbytery Plan for the St. Andrews' Cluster. The three kirk buildings are all categorised in exactly the same way.

In the second place, it has brought into sharper focus how out of date these comments were for the three Kirk Sessions have been working in such a way that they are exceeding what was expected of them in the original Plan. This

is to be commended by the congregation for it looks to be an exciting prospect for a more settled future.

The third significant event involves Boarhills and Dunino which is presently linked to Holy Trinity. The Presbytery Plan states that Boarhills and Dunino should 'consider becoming a Local Mission Church'. This was discussed in Kirk Session on two occasions. The Kirk Session was strongly of the opinion that they should not become a Local Mission Church.

Having considered what the Presbytery asked them to do, there was no need for any further deliberations. However, following the untimely death of the Session Clerk, Ken Morris, the Kirk Session approached me and asked to consider uniting with their long-term partners, Holy Trinity.

Discussions ensued in both Kirk Sessions. A 'Basis of Union' was drawn up and agreed by both. It has now gone to the Presbytery for approval. Once this has been gained, voting on this 'Basis of Union' will formally take place in both Kirk Sessions and congregations prior to the union of the two.

None of this would have happened without the hard work of both Kirk Sessions. The progress made in St. Andrews and the changes being effected within our well-established linkage are remarkable. At this time of light shining in the darkness, I call upon both congregations to give thanks for their Kirk Sessions and pray for two fruitful unions sometime in 2023

Community Council Stuart Meiklejohn Trophy.


A very big `thank you` to the team – Dave, Pat,

Does this remind you of anything? What about some of the churches you know, or used to know, so often locked up for most of the week?

The medieval church was not like that. It was open from early morning till dusk and as well as holding services, it was a fine big place where anyone could drop in to rest, to pray, ask for help and feel safe. That's what I think the first Holy Trinity Church building must have been like and when in the early 1900s the later building was replaced by the present one that's what the architects hoped to reproduce.

We have an amazing building and a sacred space here in Holy Trinity. As you sit in your pew at 11.15 or listen to a concert, share in a session meeting or a coffee morning or a soup lunch, look round you prayerfully and ask God how we can use His house to win souls for him.

When I first thought of becoming a member of Holy Trinity, I expected it would take time to be accepted and prepared to be patient - not a bit of it. I was made to feel at home immediately and invited to join the Guild and take part in whatever was happening. That's quite a time ago now, but one of the things people say about our congregation is how welcomed they feel not just by the elders at the door but by everyone in the pews and in the coffee time afterwards. A welcoming greeting, a smile, and an invitation to coffee or to a meeting and perhaps to a meal or a cup of tea show that this is a place where everyone is welcome, old, young, mid-life, comfortably off, just about managing or on benefits. This really IS God's house and he trusts us to welcome everyone to it as He would.

In these difficult times when so many people are finding life difficult, not only financially, though that is important, but also because they are lonely or stressed or need practical help, God is asking us to throw open our doors (then push them shut to keep the heat in, of course) and welcome all who come seeking. Some come ready to offer what they can, others in need, all giving, all receiving according to their need and their plenty.

I give grateful thanks to all who all through the days and weeks use their time and their gifts to breathe the breath of God's love into this beautiful building, built with prayer love and hope as a gift to Him.



There was a Christmas tree festival in the church from 11-18th December.


16 Christmas trees were placed in the Nave and organisations were asked to decorate a tree. All proceeds were given to Maggies Cancer Care charity.


Book Review

Sleeping Giant, by Rev Tommy MacNeil from Martins Memorial

Church in Stornaway is an honest, thought provoking rallying call to the THE CHURCH IN SCOTLAND.

The chapter headings give a flavour, including "The church's one priority" and "The crucial element missing in the church"

The one on "God's retirement plan" should especially speak to us oldies. It starts with a quote from the book of Joshua in which Caleb says
