MARION'S PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends,

By the time you read this we will be well into the season of Advent, that time of preparation for the annual celebration for the arrival of the Saviour of the World in human form. But have you ever stopped to think about what the season of Christmas really is? The media want us to believe that it is a time for children, for family get togethers, for parties, for excesses of all sorts, and it is true



that all these things can be important parts of the celebration.

But first and foremost, Christmas should be a season of great rejoicing because of God's coming into the world of our human experience in fulfilment of his promises made so long ago. It should be a time when hearts and minds find their way to Bethlehem to worship and give thanks – even if they never come to worship at any other time of year. After all, it is a celebration that marks the birthday of the Saviour. In the Gospel of St John we read that Jesus is the light of the world and that 'the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.' At this time when there is so much darkness of suffering and war in the world, we need the light of Christ now more than ever.

Love and prayer - an unstoppable combination. It's always nice to be asked to write for the magazine and just before I fell asleep I found myself wondering what to write about. Looking back over my past years as a member of Holy Trinity I remembered some hard and searching times for us and I look back with love and gratitude to the small group of faithful members and the retired minister who kept the church open and alive



after the death of Rev Charles Armour. It can't have been easy for them and I am thrilled that the daughter of one of them has come back to live here and is part of our congregation again. But I'm not going to look back over the past because I want to write about love and prayer, the most important things in a congregation and its leaders.

When the teacher asked Tommy Jones why he had only answered half of the last question on the exam paper he replied "I ran out of paper, Miss". She looked at him and sighed "Why didn't you ask me for another sheet?" Is that how God feels when we don't ask for what we need?

In Luke's gospel (ch 18:1-8) Jesus tells the story of the importunate widow who badgered a lawyer to take up her case until he gave in and agreed. Jesus tells us she was right and not a nuisance. Those who heard the story must have been intrigued for Jesus used it to remind his listeners not to give up asking God for help but did not mean that God, unlike the lawyer, needed to be badgered, God doesn't always answer our needs in the way we expect and often answers them when we have not asked, but, like any loving father, hopes that those in need of help of any kind will come to him just as you or I might ask a friend or a kind boss for help or advice. Don't neglect prayer and remember that it can be really simple, just one to one, you to God, and

not always in beautiful words. And don't forget to look back to see how God HAS answered your prayers and remember to thank him too. When I look back over the last 5 years or so I see how God has blessed us and changed us as a congregation. He has sent us love and is showing us how to love and value each other. We are led by people who love us, even when we are difficult, and who encourage us to love and serve others and find our own skills and talents. Look around you with imagination and see or even guess the love and care and hope which so many members share with others. God is encouraging us to use our varied talents in his work in this place and there is a real bond in our union with BoarhIIIs and Dunino and a real sense of love, peace and joy in our congregation.

My sister-in-law who is disabled and almost blind was given a telephone buddy and looked forward to their conversations but, sadly, the buddy only talked about herself and the conversations ended. Love is bigger than that and paired with prayer can do miracles, so keep praying and loving. Be proud and amazed that God accepts and values your help and mine to build his Kingdom in this town,

ANOTHER THOUGHT

Returning to St Andrews

St Andrews was my home for the first eighteen years of my life, living in 'The Red House' which my parents (George & Irene Caithness) bought in 1960. Myself, my sister Janet, and the twins Colin & Alastair had a wonderful childhood here, revolving around home, school, the beach, sports and Christmas (which was a huge event in our house) to name just a few, and of course Holy Trinity Church.



I then had four fabulous years as a student in Edinburgh. I was the P.R. person for Edinburgh Students Charities campaign, which resulted in a job offer from the Scotsman after my graduation, and started me on my career path in the exciting and ever-changing media world.

After eight years in Edinburgh, I found myself in Fleet Street working for The Observer newspaper and magazine. It was the 80's and London was vibrant and exhilarating. We worked hard and partied harder!

Towards the end of the 80's I went to my brother's (Alastair) wedding in New Zealand, via Singapore and Hong Kong. Suddenly I realised that there was a huge world out there with many opportunities! I packed up and started on a trip around the world (supposedly for a year!), travelling through the USA, New Zealand and Australia and then Indonesia, Singapore, Malaysia, Thailand and Hong Kong. My parents met me in Hong Kong and we travelled to China, ending our trip in Beijing, exploring the Forbidden City and into Tiananmen Square which was full of peacefully demonstrating students. The date was June 1, 1989. We flew back to Hong Kong, and my parents travelled back to St Andrews, while I started work at the Hong Kong Standard newspaper. Hong Kong, which was a British Colony was an amazing and magical city, with my night life as demanding as my day job! A couple of days later on June 4, the world witnessed what is known as 'The Tiananmen Square Massacre' and we were horrified that the peaceful students we had encountered on June 1 were now in this dreadful situation. However, I had itchy feet, and found myself next in Bangkok, launching a new English language Asian business magazine. Thailand was a very challenging place for foreigners at that time, especially trying to do business. I have memories of being trapped in taxis in monsoon rain, flooded streets and traffic jams which lasted for hours!

After a year the company moved me to Singapore to set up our regional office, and what a contrast! Everything worked, English was spoken, people were courteous, public transport was excellent and the streets sparkled. I loved working in Singapore. This was the time of the Nick Leeson scandal, which brought down Barings Bank, and Nick was often seen in our favourite bar, 'Harry's Bar' on the Singapore river.

I was then offered a job in Dubai and jumped at the chance to work in a completely different part of the world. Dubai was still a small city on the verge of expanding into the glitzy city of today. I worked at The Khaleej Times newspaper and every day my drive to work was re-routed round building sites as the new Dubai emerged.

A timely opportunity to move back to Hong Kong just before the handover in 1997, meant I split my time between Hong Kong and Singapore, which was double the fun! It also meant I was in Hong Kong for a very wet and sad handover to China. Nothing changed overnight, but the Chinese influence became apparent as all the top jobs changed to Chinese personnel, and the British backpackers who had been running the bars, restaurants, hotels and shops, now had to get work permits. The mood and vibe of Hong Kong changed.

When my latest media contract finished in 2000, I thought.... what next?

A Scottish doctor friend asked if I would temporarily manage his practice, as his manager had left suddenly. Little did I realise that this was going to be a huge leap from media into healthcare for me, and lead to many exciting opportunities.

A few months later I was offered a P.A. position with a British Orthopaedic surgeon (Dr Jason Brockwell) working in Hong Kong. I had to search for a central property where Jason could set up his own Sports Medicine Clinic. Once the property was found and the renovations started, the huge undertaking of buying equipment, interviewing staff and everything entailed in setting up a business was full on! This was to be a totally integrated Sports Medicine Clinic with surgeons, doctors, physios, MRI & Xray department, a gym for bio-mechanics plus many other services such as podiatry and dietetics. In just over a year we opened the clinic and it won its first award for 'Innovation and Service') the first of many awards) and is now recognised as one of the top Sports Medicine Clinics in Hong Kong.

After the Hong Kong clinic was settled and established I moved back to Dubai, by now a very glitzy city, and worked with a Swedish Sports Medicine Doctor (Dr Anna Zickerman) who was aiming to set up her own Sports Medicine Clinic. There was a lot more red tape and admin in Dubai, and we had a few false starts, but we finally opened to huge acclaim and much success again, once the clinic was established, I decided it was time for my next adventure.

I had a villa in Phuket, and decided to move there and start my own business. I bought a 10 apartment rental business, naming it 'Pineapple Apartments' ,and started the very difficult job of hiring Thai staff. Thais are not known for their willingness to work nor their reliability! On my first Christmas, I found myself cleaning rooms and toilets! Fortunately, a buyer appeared out of the blue and offered me nearly double the price I had paid originally. My cleaning days were over!

People often say you are 'Living the Dream!' when you are living in the sunshine, but at some point in your life you need to stop and take stock of what you've done, where you've been and what you want from life next.

On holiday in Edinburgh in December 2019, I made the decision to move back to UK/Europe (I was undecided which) and gave myself a 2 year exit strategy. However, covid intervened and it took me slightly longer!

Arriving in Edinburgh in March this year, I encountered an extreme temperature drop from 32 degrees to -2 degrees in a 24 hour period. That was hard! However, my sister took me in hand the next day and we went shopping for warm clothes and an electric blanket!

Six weeks later I moved to St Andrews and quickly settled into my cosy bungalow. It feels like I've come home, and in reality I have. I am extremely happy to be back amidst old friends, new friends and of course family.

Life, for me, has come full circle and St Andrews is again my home.

BOARHILLS AND DUNINO

As we finish our second Union service, so well attended by the joint congregation, it is time not just to look forward but also back and to acknowledge the work done so tirelessly in the background often unseen.

Over the last 40 years Dunino has seen many changes the current Union being just one of several but throughout the time we have been guided for a large



period by Geoffrey Sprot, our session Clerk, who oversaw for many years the extremely smooth running of the session. For the last 23 years he was aided and abetted by Dr Joe Fairburn who filled the role as treasurer a vital role normally avoided by all. Not only did Joe fill this role but he developed a very deep understanding of the mechanics of the system enduring that whilst we always paid our way he ensured that every penny due to us or back to us was received and went back into our funds.

We have been very fortunate in receiving into the congregation many highly skilled Church of Scotland members from other charges two of which gave great service but who are no longer with us. Dr Chris Fraser from Martyrs who single handed obtained for a donation our wonderful organ and then installed it, following up by then running the church board. The second was Ken Morris who was talked into becoming an Elder and found himself as Session Clerk when illness forced me to step down. Ken was the blueprint for a Session Clerk from organising the pandemic seating to short notice stand ins to take the service. His is still so sadly missed

HISTORY IN DUNINO

Over the years, when visiting Dunino Churchyard and Den, many people have left small tokens in embedded in tree trunks or the rocks in the den but the biggest accumulation has always been on the ancient sundial in the Churchyard itself.

These tokens range from small coloured pebbles, coloured glass, shopping trolley tokens, and shells but the biggest

majority are small coins.



Recently the number of items on the sundial was getting so large and many had been there so long that they were getting very rusty. Some of them were also beginning to fall off the stone so it was decided to remove them and give the coins that were recognisable to a charity.

A week or so ago, member Grace Morris took home the heavy bundle of dirty coins and soaked them overnight before discarding the unrecognisable, rusty coins and other bits and pieces and leaving the coins to dry off.

The total, in mostly 1p and 2p coins came to £21.24, which went to Save the Children, almost 2 dollars in US currency, a number of different foreign coins and 1.5 euros.

Whilst showing a visitor the sundial last week, it was noted that a few small tokens had already been placed on the sundial, as is shown in the photograph taken for this item.

CHILDREN'S CORNER

Hello again, girls and boys, Have you ever looked up at the night sky, and wondered how many stars there are? Astronomers say the naked eye can only see stars in the 'Milky Way' galaxy, which includes our sun, a medium-sized star. God who made the earth, the air, the sky, the sea, who gave the light its birth, careth for me.

God who made the sun, The moon, the stars, is he who, when life's clouds come on, careth for me.

Astronomers reckon that

our galaxy contains at least (wait for it!) 100 billion stars. Think that sounds a lot? The Palace of Monimail, also known as Monimail Tower, or Cardinal Beaton's Tower, or even Monimail Castle was a Renaissance Palace in Fife which was a residence of the Archbishops of St Andrews from the 13th century.

In the early 17th century Monimail became the chief seat of the Melville family.

The small tower is all that remains of the former Palace.

Nowadays the tower and gardens are looked after by the Monimail Tower Project. Admission is free.

There is a donations box for those wishing to make a contribution. On the first floor of the tower is a small but very interesting museum. The Blue Room on the second floor is worth a visit on your climb up

stairs.

Be sure also to check out their library, and the Collessie Warrior.

Continuing up the stairs to the very top allows access out on to the open roof. with stunning views across Fife.
