MARION'S PASTORAL LETTER

Dear Friends,

I couldn't believe it when I looked at the gospel reading for the Sunday after I came back from holiday, for it could not have been more appropriate! I had just returned from cruising in the Arctic and High Arctic in storm force winds and with a twenty-five foot plus swell. To say the weather was bad was an understatement. But the whole holiday was a great adventure. It was almost impossible to walk on an outside deck for much of the time, and decanting to small boats was certainly challenging. It was all very different from life at home.



Each night as I went to bed in my cabin, the words of an old hymn went through my mind as a prayer, and they were very appropriate for they said. 'Rocked in the cradle of the deep, I lay me down in peace to sleep. Secure I rest upon the wave, for Thou, O Lord, hast power to save'. Secure in that knowledge, I am told that I managed to sleep through the worst of the storm that woke almost everyone else up and kept the captain up all night! And certainly, I was one of very few who went to breakfast the next morning! My holiday was certainly an adventure and I look forward to the next one. But what was the gospel reading? Well, it was the miracle of calming of the storm.

We all have to face storms of various sorts in life from time to time. They may not be storms at sea, but they can be equally devastating if we allow them to be so. They can be storms of misunderstanding and anger, storms of argument, storms of ill health, storms of arrangements that have gone wrong and caused anxiety. And when they come about, we tend to look for someone or something to blame, and we often become very upset by them.

The disciples in the boat with Jesus expected him to do something practical to help deal with the effects of the storm, but instead he said to the wind and waves 'Peace, be still'. And that is exactly what happened. But surely the message of this miracle is more far-reaching than simply a rough sea, for we see that at the same time as he calmed the waves, Jesus calmed the storm of fear in the hearts of those who were with him in the boat. That didn't mean that they were able to stop sailing the boat. It simply meant that they had no need to be afraid because Jesus was with them.

We are living in very challenging times. The world situation is to say the least, volatile. The political situation in our land is uncertain. There are areas in our towns and cities where it is unsafe to walk the streets. And levels of mental health problems and substance abuse are frightening. But Jesus says to us 'Peace, be still'. 'Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?'

We would not be human if we did not worry about the circumstances in which we live and what the future holds both for our church and for our daily lives. But Jesus says to us 'Why are you so afraid? Have you still no faith?' 'Peace, be still'. And we all know that in the end our future in every respect is in God's hands and that he loves us. This means that we have no need to be afraid. We simply need to go on doing our best in every circumstance, safe in the knowledge that God in Christ through his Holy Spirit is always with us, and that he loves us. It is sometimes hard for us to hold on to those thoughts, just as it was hard to hold

It is sometimes hard for us to hold on to those thoughts, just as it was hard to hold on for the disciples in the boat, or indeed, for those on my cruise to feel truly safe. However, let us do our best to look forward in faith, for we are as the hymn says, 'Rocked in the cradle of the deep, ... and Thou, O Lord, hast power to save'.

Amongst my papers I found this poem, which I thought was very relevant.



SPECIAL SERVICES: Pentecost

We don't often celebrate Pentecost in a big way in Boarhills, Dunino and Holy Trinity, although it is the Birthday of the Church, as signified by the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples. Marion preached a powerful sermon on the day.

Our fellow Christians in Tayport made a great show this year with flames held up by helium balloons all along the church railings, and in the church in Inveraray, they had a new pulpit fall illustrating the risen Jesus.



This flyer surfaced recently, though it is not new, and we hadn't featured it before. I have no idea who, at Presbytery of St Andrews initiated it, but again it is an encouragement to ask for MORE.

The invocation "Come Holy Spirit" is a powerful prayer, which has been answered over the centuries by wonderful examples of His coming.

More recently in the Praise gathering in the Glasgow Concert Hall, the presence of the Holy Spirit was described by some as 'palpable' after Rev Kenny Borthwick spoke, for only a few moments, followed by a long silence.

In the past, the order of Knights of St John, originally founded in Jerusalem, moved to Rhodes and Crete after huge battles with the Ottoman empire and are now based in Malta.

HOLY TRINITY TRUST - June Report

DISABLED ACCESS:

Following the last Session meeting, Graham Wynd and Bob Archer met to discuss how the plans for disabled access, prepared by architects in the recent Design Study, could be used as the basis for a permanent solution for disabled access to the Church.

It was acknowledged that the architects' plans covered access ramps for the John Knox Porch and West Door.

Adam Staniland, architect of Nicoll Russell Studios, visited the Church and produced a sketch of how a permanent ramp to the Hunter & Memorial Door could be built. This was available to the Session meeting on 6 June.

OPENING THE CHURCH TO VISITORS:

Alison and Graham Wynd, in collaboration with Bob and Joan Archer, have organised opening the Church to visitors this summer.

Drawing on experience from last year, it is planned to open three days per week (weddings and other Church events permitting) from 11 am to 5 pm, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, from 6 June to 31 August (13 weeks).

An appeal, made to those who volunteered as guardians last year, has yielded encouraging results and there are now comparatively few unfilled slots in the rota, which is available at the back of the church. Nonetheless, more guardians may be sought from outwith the Church, eg from St Andrews Rotary.

Another important need is for another, say two, volunteers to augment the Wynds and the Archers in acting as organisers on opening days, to open, prepare and close the Church and deal with any issues.



KEY ITEMS OF INTEREST TO VISITORS

- 1. The Atmosphere arising from centuries of devotional use.
- 2. The original Mediaeval Design, visible today in the restoration of 1909.

3. The **Tower** dating from 1412, used for a long time as a jail.

4. The Stained Glass Windows

- The West Window was given by the women of the congregation. It has the theme of the Work of Women for Christ and His Church, extolling the virtues of fidelity, charity, hope and patience.
- The East Window inspired by the Te Deum 'we praise the Lord'. Both are the work of David Strachan, 1875-1950.
- 5. The **Font** and **Pulpit** were given as a memorial and appreciation of A K H Boyd, Minister from 1865-1899. The pulpit's base is lona marble with onyx and alabaster columns.
- 6. The **Organ** was rebuilt by Harrison and Harrison of Durham in 1966, and again in 2008.

7. The War Memorials:

- First World War 18 Stained Glass Windows in the clerestory, which depict the badges of the twelve Scottish Infantry Regiments, the Royal Navy, the Royal Artillery, the Royal Engineers, the Royal Air Force and the Royal Army Medical Corps.
- Second World War simple glowing window in the Hunter & Memorial Aisle.
- 8. The **John Knox Porch** commemorates the reformer. The ancient Church porch occupied the same site. In 1617, James VI stood here to receive an address of welcome.
- 9. There are two **Golfing Memorials**:
 - a plaque at the back of the Church commemorates Tom Morris, the great golfer, also an elder of Holy Trinity Church;
 - a bombard, a division of fanfare trumpets, was added to the organ in memory of the golfer Bobby Jones.

One item not mentioned in the guide this time round is the wonderful representation of the Ascension, which hangs near the John Knox door. This was painted by Eddy Turner, who came reluctantly to 'Breakfast at Trinity' and whose life was completely changed by the worship, teaching and fellowship. He donated it to the church in Gratitude (Ed)



The inflow of enquiries and bookings continues to be greater than in previous years and, already, the average number of paying events to the end of 2024 exceeds one per week. A number of concerts from regular clients have attracted audiences in their hundreds. The quality of music from professional and amateur musicians has been outstanding.

It is planned to hold a retrospective exhibition in the Sharp Aisle of works by Jurek Putter, local artist, known for his depictions of mediaeval St Andrews.

It is also planned to organise a Christmas Tree Festival in December, on the lines of the one that took place in 2022. Managing the increasing volume of events is a challenge that needs to be addressed.

BOARHILLS, DUNINO & HOLY TRINITY GUILD





and THE FOUR FISHERMEN – the first Disciples of Jesus and the miracle of their catch!



THOUGHTS 2

Hearing voices

One of the times when I hear my mother's or my grandmother's voice in my head is when I recall one of their sayings. They seemed to have a sharp or telling phrase for so many events in our daily life. "A lazy man takes the most pains". "Eyes bigger than belly" "You'll regret that in the morning" "You can lock away from thieves but not from liars!." "Try reading the instructions" "Two's company, three's a crowd" A few pithy words for almost every occasion and, yes I hear them still, and sometimes find myself using them.

Some of these phrases had biblical origins as my mother's family were churchgoers and my grandfather was a Methodist local preacher. "God will provide" he would say, or "Come ye apart", "Love your neighbour as yourself" "Do not be afraid for God is with you".

These family sayings and, particularly, my grandfather's, remind me that when he taught the crowds, Jesus, who like so many Jewish teachers and wise men, was steeped in the Old Testament, used quotations from it and references to it in his teachings which his Jewish hearers would pick up and understand but which must sometimes have bypassed those of other faiths who came to hear him and wonder at his teaching.

Those familiar words and examples used to illustrate the points Jesus made in his teaching often annoyed the well-versed Scribes and some of the ordinary men and women in the crowds. The Scribes became angry because Jesus' interpretation of the biblical truths he talked about was very different from their convoluted and over-complicated Interpretation of them and of the Law. The ordinary people in the crowds were amazed at the straightforward, simple and wise ways in which Jesus used them.

Spend some time re-reading one of the gospels, perhaps in a modern translation and see how simply and clearly Jesus interprets God's rules for life as set out in the Old Testament. Stop and see just how they could or should or do apply to your own life and ask God to help you keep them every single day.

That's exactly why Jesus came to the world and why his followers wrote their accounts of his life and teaching.

BOOKS

9 o' clock in the morning. Rev Dennis Bennet

A young couple, full of joy, suddenly started coming to everything in his church.

Two ministers discussed this warily. What had happened? They'd been to an enjoyable prayer meeting and had been prayed for to receive the Holy Spirit and were speaking in tongues!


The ministers had not been trained in this at theological college but the young couple explained "It's in the Bible", Acts 2. (Check out Acts and see what we're missing) The author did some research and found that there were 240 references to the Holy Spirit in the New Testament. His head was struggling so much but he knew his heart wanted what the young couple had and after 3 months he asked to receive the Holy Spirit fully without reservations. The Holy Spirit filled him as requested and ultimately he was asked to take this teaching all round the world and many lives and churches were transformed as the Holy Spirit brought new life.

Some very interesting episodes occurred as the Holy Spirit moved among them. The author's sons were challenged by other youths in a burger bar; their fists quickly clenched ready to take them on but suddenly the sons' hands dropped to their sides and they found themselves saying "We're not going to fight you. We're Christians." The two tough guys turned pale, took to their heels and ran away!

A stranger reported to the minister that "Two of your members prayed for me for 3 hours and got me straightened out. I was amazed they cared for me so much." (Of course, Jesus and Holy Spirit did the straightening.)

This should be the normal Christian life.

Although this topic is rarely mentioned in churches, Jesus did it all the time in His time on earth and commanded and gave authority to the disciples, Matt. 10:1, and to the Seventy who came back rejoicing 'Lord even the demons are subject to us IN YOUR NAME'.

So is this relevant today? Absolutely Yes. In South Africa, a white friend and I were talking about a course, 'Deliverance in the African Context'. Her comment was 'They need it'! Actually, the difference is that they know they need it. Europeans tend to dismiss this issue as a 'First Century concept' and don't know that they need it or indeed that it is available and that 'Jesus is the same, yesterday, today and forever.'

Derek Prince suggests 4 preconditions for deliverance:-

- 1. Be sure you have repented that is turned away from any sin.
- 2. Look only to Jesus. He alone is the Deliverer.
- 3. Base your appeal solely on what Jesus did for you through His death on the Cross, not on any 'good works' of your own.
- 4. Be sure, that, by an act of your will, you have forgiven every person who has harmed or wronged you.

Jesus promises that everyone who calls on the Name of the Lord shall be saved and that in My Name you shall expel demons. We can do it through Him.

'Pigs in the Parlour' also advocates expelling demons. If a pig comes into your parlour, you don't invite it to sit down, you say get out and back it up with action fast!

Having done as directed, ask Jesus to fill you up with His Holy Spirit to prevent any return. Derek Prince provides many examples of the freedom that follows deliverance, both personally and in others. 'If the Son sets you free, you shall be free indeed.'



Then He said, "Go out, and stand on the mountain before the Lord." And behold, the Lord passed by, and a great and strong wind tore into the mountains and broke the rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a still small voice."

1 Kings 19:11-12, NKJV

Elijah was running away from Jezebel, as she had threatened to kill him. He was so afraid that he was praying that God would take away his life, rather than asking God to keep him safe. While he slept under the tree, he was twice woken up by an angel, who provided him with food to eat. That food sustained him forty days and forty nights, until he reached Mount Horeb, the mountain of the Lord (1 Kings 19:8).

Like Elijah, you may be running away from something you are confronted with. You may run from one country to another, or from one relationship to another. What is it that you are confronted with? Is it a threat, or is it control by someone? Is it that someone wants to bring you low, or to bring you humiliation and shame?

You need not catch the next flight to go to Mount Horeb, but you can run to the mountain of the Lord any time, wherever you may be, because the blood of Jesus brings us near to God. Sometimes, like Elijah, you may be experiencing weariness in your soul and body, which causes you to go to sleep. But look out for those divine visitations of angels from the Lord. It could be a friend, a family member, or a stranger, who may just be there to feed you right now. That will sustain you for the days, and months, and years ahead. But once you regain your energy, run to meet with God in worship, and in the word, and stand before the presence of God.

Like Elijah you may be expecting God to be in the strong wind, the earthquake, or the fire. But you may not find God speaking to you, concerning your situation, in the ways you think. Quieten yourself to hear His gentle whisper. You will then receive strength to face whatever you are running away from.
