# MARION'S PASTORAL LETTER

I suspect like many of you, I have been affected by the noise and inconvenience of constant roadworks outside my house. I have also been having work done on my roof and both my neighbours have been having work done on their houses. In a fairly narrow street, this means that there have lots of vans parked outside, and a huge amount of noise which seems to have gone on and on. For someone working from home, and used to a quiet environment, this has been both frustrating and distracting. But then all our lives can be like that from time to time. The same would apply to the life of the church. There are



smooth periods when everything goes to plan, the congregation seem happy and vibrant, and the future witness of the family of God seems secure. But sadly, that is not the case in the Church of Scotland at the moment. Almost everyone I meet who is involved in the church, seems to have a story of closure, hurt, and discontent to tell. And the future all over the country looks, to say the least, uncertain. However, after a long period in limbo when we have coped with a long series of difficulties, we in Boarhills, Dunino and St Andrews Holy Trinity have been given an opportunity to secure our future witness in our communities. However, we must be careful not to squander this opportunity but to grasp it with enthusiasm. And this depends on all of us doing our bit for the building of the kingdom in this place.

Let us think for a moment about the Easter story in our Scriptures. God asked his son Jesus to come down to the earth, and carry the burden of the world's sin, which was separating the people from their God. To do this, Jesus was to live his life in service to the world. Eventually, this would mean that he would be put to death on the Cross of Calvary. His sacrifice would wipe out the errors, mistakes and failures of everyone who could accept that he had done this for them. As Jesus walked this earth, he met many distractions and inconveniences, which could have thrown him off course, However, despite all, we are told that even knowing what lay ahead, he still resolutely set out for Jerusalem because he knew it was God's will as well as what was needed for the salvation of the world. For Jesus there was no turning back, no turning away from the Father's will. And the end result was that death was defeated in the glorious resurrection that we celebrate on Easter Day!

# AN UPDATE FROM FIFE PRESBYTERY

Following the decision of the former St Andrews Presbytery in October 2014 not renew the tenure of the last minister inducted into Holy Trinity, this congregation has been in a state of limbo. We have been well served by Interim Moderators and an Interim Minister. However, in 2017 a system of Guardianship was put into place and our locum minister Marion Paton was appointed.

The Guardianship began in January 2018. One important consequence of a Guardianship is that a charge may continue but without the right to call a minister. It also involves Presbytery appointing an interim moderator to ensure that appropriate arrangements are in place to enable the ongoing Ministry and Mission of the Congregation. A number of Interim Moderators have been appointed and at present we are blessed to have Rev Alastair Symington as our Interim Moderator. The Kirk Session happily voted to keep Marion as our Locum Minister. All of this brings with it uncertainty for the future of our newly united Congregation of Boarhills, Dunino and St Andrews: Holy Trinity. That uncertainty was aggravated by the creation of the Presbytery Mission Plan Act.

Fife Presbytery created a Mission Plan and worked out allocations of ministers to the various charges within its boundaries. Because we are in Guardianship we would be allocated 0.25 of a minister. All three Church of Scotland Churches in St Andrews got together over the last two years and addressed some seriously challenging issues. There had been an expectation that these three churches would come together in a union. In the end of the day our Kirk Session voted against this which was the catalyst for some heavy-duty negotiation overseen by two facilitators appointed by Presbytery culminating in a compromise which would involve a change to the Mission Plan. In achieving this we are indebted to Jayne Scrymgeour who took the lead and represented us so well at the cluster meetings and Presbytery and reporting to Session.

On Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> February Presbytery was asked to consider allowing an amendment to the Mission plan. The request made of Presbytery was to consider an arrangement whereby there was a Union between St Marks, and Cameron and St Leonard's with a Team Ministry and two full-time ministers of word and sacrament. The minister at Cameron and St Leonard's would retain his unrestricted tenure if he becomes part of the Team Ministry and the other post would be on the Basis of Reviewable Tenure. For our congregation there would be a 0.5 minister of word and sacrament on the basis of a three-year Reviewable Tenure. This request was unanimously approved by Presbytery. It is not ideal and does not remove the uncertainty for our future. It is however, we are led to believe, highly significant as it brings to and end the Guardianship and restores our right to call a minister or rather part of a minister. It should therefore be seen as a stepping stone to a more certain future.

The next steps will no doubt be addressed in conjunction with Presbytery and the other churches but nothing will change overnight. The congregation will be kept informed of all significant developments as they occur.

In our worship during the past few weeks, we have been thinking about our vision for our future. This decision of Presbytery now gives us an opportunity to turn our vision into a reality. However, that depends on every one of us doing our bit. We are all in this together, all equally important, and all have something to offer. Let us go forward in faith and service.

# FINANCE GROUP



We have just finished one financial year and are now into a new one. Last year we were fortunate to have enjoyed certain windfalls which resulted in us having a modest surplus, but looking forward having analysed all items of both income and expenditure, the conservative conclusion is that we will incur a deficit of a minimum of £10,000 pounds.

To some in the congregation it may be difficult to believe that for the coming year, despite the fact that although we hope to generate some £190,000 this is insufficient to meet anticipated costs.

Where does the money come from and what is it spent on?

Income: The largest amount 39.7% is that generated

by the church buildings from open day donations and charges levied on third party users of the hall and church plus rental of the manse. Congregational offerings including gift aid recovered are next at 34.7%. Income from investments next at 16.8%. Other donations from members are 4.8% and miscellaneous and sundry items 4%.

Expenditure: whilst not wanting to go into great detail the biggest numbers are wages and salaries including the organist and children's worker (£66k), insurance (£20k), gas & electric (£26k), payments to 121 and presbytery (£49k)



These are all big numbers and session and elders work tirelessly to ensure that we are good custodians of all that we have. Session has decided that we will not be having a big stewardship campaign but I thought that it would be right and proper that we reflect on the finances of the church and each and everyone's place in the scheme of things.

There are 317 people listed on the congregational roll but only a fraction of those attend worship at either Dunino or at Holy Trinity and contribute financially to the upkeep and the running of the church. If you are on the roll, you cost the church money, as we pay a capitation fee to Fife Presbytery



to meet their costs. At the time of the last stewardship campaign it was suggested, that for those who could afford it, that giving weekly the price of a fish supper was not unreasonable which at that time was £7. Currently the equivalent is between £11 and £15 depending on personal choice.

What I would ask of you is to ask yourself "when did I last review what I give to the church", and if possible, personal financial circumstances allowing, increase what you give and how you give. As treasurer giving monthly by standing order is my method of choice, followed by the Freewill Offering envelopes especially if you are a taxpayer and can gift aid your donations. Remember if you gift aid the government gives us £1 for every £4 donated. Last year gift aid contributed £10,200 to our total income.

A recent development that will also put pressure on the finances of the church, is that we are no longer in guardianship, and will be allowed to call a Minister. Certain allowances we enjoyed will be removed and our Giving to Grow assessment which is paid to 121 will increase.

### THE SESSION CLERK

**Presbytery Mission Plan:** What a moment! The Fife Presbytery met on 15 February and approved the proposal that Boarhills, Dunino and St Andrews: **Holy Trinity comes out of guardianship** and can call a 0.5FTE Minister of Word and Sacrament. This is hugely significant - coming out of guardianship in this way is a big vote of confidence.

#### Now it is down to us with God's guidance to make the most of it!

Huge thanks to the team who attended the meeting, in particular Jayne Scrymgeour, our Deputy Session Clerk, and Richard McFarlane, our Presbytery Liaison Elder. This has been a long journey and thanks to all for your

Presbytery Liaison Elder. This has been a long journey and thanks to all for your efforts and prayers to getting to this point. Special thanks to Marion Paton, our amazing Locum Minister and Alastair Symington, our Interim Moderator. We would have preferred to be able to call a full-time Minister and this was noted. However, there will be a review after three years, so it is down to us all now to be able to justify our case in 2028.

Moving forward: We need to increase our membership, in particular our active membership, and to bring more in our community to Jesus. We need also to increase our giving and the ways we generate income. This is essential to get us into a financially strong position to move forward in the future. Our financial situation has improved enormously in recent years and we made a small surplus last year. This is all very encouraging, but there is still much to do and we are expected to be in deficit this year.

To stop this from happening, our Treasurer, Russell Cockburn, recently asked us all, if we are able, to increase our giving and to boost income generation. (See below) Also essential is your help in the various activities of the church.

There are lots of other opportunities to get involved: helping with Outreach and Little Cherubs; helping with events; helping with the pastoral team; the Guild; with worship; with the choir; helping to look after and maintain our beautiful Holy Trinity and Dunino church buildings etc etc - the list goes on.

# Anna Coopey – Walter Blair Choral Scholar



#### Anna writes:

I've been singing since the age of eight, when I unwittingly auditioned for Coventry Cathedral Choir by singing "Happy Birthday" to myself on a primary school bench. Working with Kerry Beaumont and Paul Leddington Wright, I was in the choir for the next ten years, taking part in tours to Holland (2014), Truro (2017), and even Germany and Poland on the occasion of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Armistice, performing Britten's War Requiem alongside James Gilchrist and the Polish National Orchestra. During this time, we also recorded an album (2011), and I completed the Royal School of Church Music's Chorister Awards up to the rank of Full, and Grade 8 Vocal (ABRSM)


with Merit. I was made music librarian in 2016 and then Head Chorister in 2018-2019. While at school, I also performed in musicals (as Olive Ostrovsky in *The 25<sup>th</sup> Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*, and as Cosette in *Les Miserables*), and was part of my school's exclusive ensemble choir, *Henry's 9*.

In 2019, I made the transition to university at St Andrews for my undergraduate degree, where I gained a Vocal Scholarship at the University (2019-2023), and met Walter Blair. Alongside scholarships in St Leonard's Chapel Choir and St Andrews Renaissance Singers, and bank work with Salvator's Choir, I sang with Walter as a Holy Trinity choral scholar, and spent a good half-hour every Sunday morning of my first and second year chatting with him about inane things. He was gracious enough never to complain about my ability to consistently turn up far too early. While he was ill, I worked with other previous Holy T scholars to create the Blair Singers, a small ensemble that sang at a few weddings for a short period in 2022. I went to Oxford for my Masters, where I was made Louisa Hemming Choral Scholar with St Hilda's College (2023-2024) with Jonathan Williams, and have since returned to St Andrews this year, being rewarded with the inaugural Walter Blair Choral Scholarship. It is a great tribute to a wonderful man and a wonderful friend, and I am so grateful to have been awarded with it, and to have had the opportunity to enjoy such a wonderful building, such a musical choir, and such a fantastic community.

# FROM OUR PROPERTY CONVENER



Bob reported that at the Glow party, one of the two 'candlesticks' had fallen over and was broken. Thankfully John Taylor was able to fix it, but in conversation we talked about the fact that these were not just candlesticks, but were replicas of the Jewish Menorah, the symbol of the Jewish Nation.

On trying to discover why they are there in Holy Trinity, I found a plaque on one of the pillars, which gives the names of the donors, but no other details.





Does anyone have any idea who the folk were and why they donated the beautiful Menoras?

As a matter of interest, these are 6-branched Menorahs. At Hanukkah (The celebration of the rededication of the Temple in Jerusalem after it had been desecrated), lamps were lit, using a small amount oil found hidden. There was just enough oil to last for eight days it took to prepare new oil. The Hanukkah Menorah therefore has eight branches. These have become common Christmas decorations in Christian homes.



# THE GOLF BAG GOSPEL (from another church)

There we were, coming out "To love and serve the Lord in the name of Christ, Amen" and there they were, passing in the street. with their golf gear on. I must admit it made me feel a bit uncomfortable, it was the first time I'd missed a Sunday morning on the tee for a long time, but my wife said it was a special service and it would be good to go to church.

And then she said to me "there's more to a set of golf clubs than meets the eye".

"Right, Three woods. These represent the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

The first club you use is the **driver.** The Bible says "In the beginning, God..." It says that both in Genesis 1 and in John.1.

He's the one who started everything off, and also sustains it by His power. "He's in charge, so let Him drive!" is a good motto for Christians.

The **two wood** represents the one who's always there, either when we're in trouble (with a capital Tee) or on the fairways of life. He's needed in both circumstances and will never leave us, even when we lose our zeal.

He's the one who said "He who comes to me I will never drive away" (Jn.6:37.)

The **three wood** gives us the lift we need and is available in all circumstances. The Holy Spirit, rather like a caddie "Guides us and leads us into all truth (Jn 16:3)

The **irons**, a full set is usually ten in number, and represent the ten commandments, which are our guide for every circumstance of life. Like the tablets, they're always engraved with the sponsors name, so we know they can be relied on.

The numbers relate to the commandments. Notice how very few people ever use a **1** or a **2** iron, although these are the ones which talk about our relationship with God and the fact that we should put nothing before Him (*Exodus 20:2,4*). Most folk feel happiest with the **7**, **8** and **9** irons, convinced they're all right because they've never killed or stolen (well, only things from the office) or committed adultery (well, not actually).

The number 10 (You shall not covet anything that is your neighbour's...) is all about greed and is the wedge that keeps us apart from the people round about us, and from God.

The **putter**, like prayer, is used on every hole to finish off the play. It reminds us that nothing is accomplished in God's kingdom without prayer. It's best to use it a lot on the practice green before playing. And the nice thing is that even little children can do well with a putter. Jesus told us "When *you pray*, *pray like this..."* (Mt 6:9).

Golf can be difficult at times. Just like life we can have sudden squalls of rain and the next minute blazing sun. The **umbrella** reminds us of God's protection in a threatening world. He

went ahead of His children as a pillar of shading cloud by day and a pillar of warming fire by night. (Exodus 13:22).

Professionals never venture out without one, yet many of us go out into our daily lives without first seeking his protection. And we wonder why we get hurt!

Psalm 121:7 tells us "He will preserve you from all ill and protect you both in your going out and your coming in" (A full 18-hole round.)

The **score card** is handed in at the end of the round. At that stage the score is adjusted for your handicap. Those who have struggled with major handicaps in this life; illness (mental or physical) family burdens, poverty, etc., will be brought up alongside those who have led less troubled lives.

"And God will wipe away all tears from their eyes" (Rev. 21:4).

There are no practice rounds, or "friendlies". Life is always tough. Jesus said "In this world you will have troubles..." (Jn 16:33)

There's only one chance, and at the end, the cards are always scrutinized. "It is appointed to man once to die, and after that the judgement" (Hebrews 9: 27)

And so, we finish up at the "Nineteenth Hole". It should be a party, enjoying yourself with all the other players. But will you be there. at what John described as "the wedding supper of the lamb"? (Rev 19 (!) :9)

#### Where are YOU at present in the game of life?

Are you playing a round alone, or do you have friends (caddies) who know the rules and can help you along?

Have you joined HIS club, the church, a superb membership deal which allows free access to every branch in every country of the world. Or are you going it alone, scraping up for green fees and Sunday membership just to keep your reputation up?

And, we never forget whose we are and whom we serve - our Lord Jesus Christ.







# **BDHT MONTHLY KIDS' CLUB**







#### taken over this role from Ron.



### **THOUGHTS**

#### Ten fingers typing ....

I expect those of you who were in Church on Sunday 9th February will remember young Eve and her mother sharing the Bible readings, side by side, as Eve read out in a loud voice the words from Isaiah 6 21-8 - 'Here am I, Send Me!' It was for me, and I am sure for Eve and her mother and for many in the pews a moment to remember.

I often think and talk about God's co-incidences and wonder if this was one of them. Our church is facing an uncertain future and though I am sure that God has a plan for us and will carry it out, it may not be easy because he has given us free will and wants each one of us to share in



his work, so we need to look outside ourselves and step up to the tasks that he needs us to do. Just as he said to Isaiah 'Who will go for us?' each one of us needs to listen for that voice and to reply, just as Eve did in church the other day: 'Here am I, send me'.

Getting older, not able to walk far, getting more forgetful, less able to do what I once could, like some of us, or busy with work and family and problems as many others are, we wonder just how we can share in God's work as he is asking us to do. But don't despair, just offer yourself and keep your eyes and ears open and don't be afraid to step forward just as Isaiah did and, I imagine as Eve and her Mum did when they agreed to read the lesson in church. Somehow you will find yourself part of what might be called God's team and, if you worship here, an important part of Boarhills, Dunino and Holy Trinity's workforce.

Over the last few years there are so many things I can no longer do well or easily any more and I expect I am not alone in this. But I have found a new task, writing a column for the St Andrews Citizen and Signpost, and even writing for this newsletter. It's strange. I nearly always KNOW what to write and can only hope that what my fingers type out are what God wants others to read, not my words, and not perfect, because I'm certainly far from perfect, but can only hope that God will use them to encourage and help all who read them.

# LIFE AS IT IS...(232) From our missionary partner in Bolivia



This **Boliva** year celebrates the bicentenary its foundation on Independence Day, the 6<sup>th</sup> August, two hundred years since the Republic came into existence. The MAS government is celebrating this anniversary despite re-founded having **Bolivia** the as

Plurinational State of Bolivia in 2010 and inaugurated a separate bank holiday, January 22<sup>nd</sup>, to mark that. Our new prison ID cards have the bicentenary logo on them.

Instead of having an extra national bank holiday to celebrate the bicentenary, the government has opted for giving each of the nine regions its own bank holiday

In Oruro the bank holiday is the 10<sup>th</sup> February which commemorates the Oruro Revolution on that date in 1781 but on 6<sup>th</sup> October Oruro also honours the1810 Revolution, when Oruro joined the revolution already taking place in Cochabamba. I live on Ayacucho Street (named for the Battle of Ayacucho in the Independence wars) between 6 de octubre street and Soria Galvarro (a famous law specialist, diplomat and writer from Oruro) street. 1810, was the first significant defeat of the Spanish colonial army by republican forces.
